KLAN MEETING IS FIRED KKK ORGANIZER CHASED UPON AT LEBANON, KY. Dr. Hawkins and Wife Targets of

Lebanon, Ky .- No arrests have followed the attack made on an alleged Klan meeting by aliens here on the night of December 12 when approximately 50 shots were fired at the hall in which the meeting was held and all the window lights broken. In addition to the bullets, bricks and stones were hurled through the air, many of them striking the Hawkins motor car. building and damaging it. No one

was seriously hurt. The chief of police acted at once to put down the riot and succeeded in getting quiet restored before anyone was killed.
