RE: Response of Carol A. Overland to May 16, 2023 Letter

Dear Hon. Judge Lennon:

Thank you for taking a close look at the procedures, nominations, and appointments to the Red Wing Charter Commission. On April 26, 2023, the Charter Commission voted unanimously to reappoint me to a four-year term. "As Red Wing's Mayor," Wilson challenges that vote.

By way of introduction, I am an attorney licensed in good standing in Minnesota. I have a 28 year history of advocacy as an attorney, and have been an advocate from age 15, when I testified in a Consent Decree hearing, contesting the Decree's definition of "segregated" schools because thirty percent minority schools were "segregated" and all white schools were not. My practice focuses on individuals, organizations, townships, and cities faced with utility infrastructure and land-use proposals in their communities, empowering intervenors, and helping them navigate the arcane administrative and local government process. I also advocate as an individual in my own city and county, and sometimes at the legislature.

Concerning paragraph 4 of your May 16, 2023 letter, requesting:

- 4. Response from Carol Overland as to her campaign finance violations from the November 8, 2022 election cycle and her April 24, 2023 email to the Council.
- I. <u>OVERLAND HAD NO CAMPAIGN FINANCE VIOLATIONS FROM</u> NOVEMBER 8, 2022 CYCLE

I was not a candidate in the November 8, 2022 election cycle and have no campaign finance violations from that cycle. I am, however, the person who filed a Campaign Finance Complaint against the "Recall City Hall" individuals running for Red Wing City Council as a bloc, and

entities campaigning for these candidates, in the August 2022 special election for Ward 2 and the November 8, 2022 election cycle. This included two organizations, 1) Recall City Hall c/o George Hintz and Paul Kampe, and 2) Citizens for Responsible Govt/Red Wing CRG c/o Tom Drazkowski; and City Council candidates: Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Donald Kliewer, Jason J. Snyder, and Ted Siefert. After a Prehearing Conference presided over by ALJ Lipman and review of the filings, the OAH panel issued the following Order, finding merit in the Complaint, that each of them had violated campaign finance law and were fined accordingly:

Based upon the record herein, and for the reasons stated in the following Memorandum, the Panel makes the following:

ORDER

- By 4:30 p.m. on Friday, February 24, 2023, Respondent Recall City Hall committee shall pay a civil penalty of \$50 for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 2. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Citizens for Responsible Government committee shall pay a civil penalty of **\$250** for violating Minn. Stat. §§ 211A.02, 211B.04, subd. 2.
- 3. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Farrar shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 4. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Goggin shall pay a civil penalty of **\$100** for violating Minn. Stat. §§ 211A.02, 211B.15.
- By 4:30 p.m. on Friday, February 24, 2023, Respondent Kliewer shall pay a civil penalty of \$50 for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- By 4:30 p.m. on Friday, February 24, 2023. Respondent Seifert shall pay a civil penalty of \$50 for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 7. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Snyder shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 8. The penalties shall be paid by check made to the order of: "Treasurer, State of Minnesota," and remitted to the Office of Administrative Hearings. The docket number OAH 8-0325-38828, should be included on the check.

The Campaign Finance Board's order attached to Wilson's letter was from 2003, **TWENTY YEARS AGO**. This Order of June 5, 2003, attached as Exhibit C, was based on a Complaint of April 30, 2003. That was related to a Public Utilities Commission transmission docket, the SW MN 345kV Transmission Project (Docket 01-1958).

Transmission dockets are my niche in utility regulatory law, representing intervening clients in Arrowhead, Chisago, and intervenors in four CapX 2020 lines (Fargo to Monticello; Brookings to Hampton; Hampton to La Crosse in Minnesota and Wisconsin, and La Crosse to Madison in Wisconsin), and transmission projects in New Jersey and Arkansas. I've also represented clients challenging permitting of nuclear waste, Excelsior Energy's Mesaba Project, large solar projects in Wisconsin, and numerous wind projects in Minnesota. I've also actively participated in rulemaking for distributed generation, small wind projects, Certificate of Need Ch. 7849 and Siting Ch. 7850 rulemaking, filed several rulemaking petitions in Minnesota, and comments in rulemaking dockets and rulemaking petitions in Wisconsin.

I am familiar with Minnesota lobbying law. In 2001, when the SW MN 345kV Transmission Line project began, and through the years as it worked its way through the administrative process, there were many intervening organizations and attorneys representing them. It's important to note that at that time, as a practice, most intervenors were not registering as

lobbyists. A Complaint was filed against me in April 2003. I was one of several attorneys, and the associations that we represented, who had not registered, and of them, I was the only one who was the subject of a Complaint. In prehearing filings, and at the hearing, I openly stated I was not registered, and I did register. I also offered a chart showing all the other attorneys and associations and individuals participating in that docket who had not registered. The list was ignored, and the consensus of that 2003 panel was that there were no complaints against others, and they would focus on the complaint against me.

The order of June 25, **2003** found probable cause and three succinct points – and I complied with each of them immediately:

ORDER

The Board directs Carol Overland to amend her Lobbyist Disbursement Report for Public Intervenors Network, Inc. for the period covering January 1, 2002, through June 30, 2002, to disclose the name and address of all original sources of funding, as required by Minn. Stat. 10A.04, subd. 4, (d).

The amended Lobbyist Disbursement Report must be submitted to the Board within 30 days of the date that these findings are signed by the Board Chair.

The record in this matter and all correspondence is hereby entered into the public record in accordance with Minn. Stat. §10A.02, subd. 11. Board staff shall provide copies to Mr. Reinhardt and Ms. Overland.

Since that time, **twenty years ago**, when I represent a client before the Public Utilities Commission in a Certificate of Need or Routing docket and reach the dollar threshold, I register as a lobbyist and file the required reports. Registering as a lobbyist for certain PUC proceedings is now the norm for all intervenors, but it wasn't in 2001-2003.

Again, I had no campaign finance violations from the November 8, 2022 election cycle.

II. OVERLAND'S APRIL 24, 2023 EMAIL TO CITY COUNCIL AND MAYOR REGARDING CHARTER COMMISSION APPOINTMENTS

Returning to paragraph 4 of your letter, requesting a response to my April 24, 2023 email to the City Council, that email attached to your letter is indeed my email to the Council. I stand by the statements and assertions in my email. See Affidavit, p. 1 and Exhibits A-O. These statements I made are backed up by demonstrable facts. For example, the Recall was based on a "250 word statement" regarding Open Meeting Law, but principals admitted that it was instead about Pohlman's firing by the City Council, and the Recall was retaliation. See Exhibit D, Petition example 250 word statement:

STATEMENT OF EXPLANATION REGARDING ALBEGED MALFEASANCE OR NONFEASANCE IN OFFICE

On June 24, 2019, Council Member DEAN HOVE violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subds. 3 and 4 by discussing impermissible topics beyond the Closed Session notice for purchase of the Bauer Built property. On July 22, 2019, Council Member HOVE again violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. 13D.01, Subd. 4. On Cetober 14, 2019, Council Member HOVE again violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. 13D.01, Subd. 4. On February 8, 2021, Council Member HOVE violated Minnesota Open Meeting Law § 13D.04, Subd. 5, by meeting unlawfully without proper three days' notice; further, said Council Member violet to go into closed session without first identifying the employee or the allegations against the employee, in violation of Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subd. 3. That on February 19, 2021, Council Member HOVE violated Minnesota Open Meeting Law § 13D.05, Subd. 2(b) by voting unlawfully to deny an open City Council Council of Council Member HOVE violated Minnesota Open Meeting Law § 13D.05, Subd. 2(b) by voting unlawfully to deny an open City Council Council of Subdication of disciplinary action against Chief Roger Pohlman, thus infringing upon the rights of the public and Chief Pohlman to hear allegations against Chief Pohlman and to hear the reasoning and deliberations of the City Council, which led to his termination.

See Exhibit E, Recall was about Pohlman firing; Exhibit F, Tom Drazkowski/Citizens for

Responsible Government/Red Wing CRG flyer. As noted by ALJ Lipman in the Campaign Finance Complaint prehearing conference, it's not illegal to lie in campaign material. That is true, unfortunately, but it is an indication of a gaping ethical hole.

My April 24, 2023 email was drafted in response to the many Charter Commission applicants, and in particular, to the several Recall City Hall principals, petitioners, and/or adherents who were applicants to the Commission. The existence of the Recall bloc was evidenced by Councilor Farrar's attempt to appoint four of the Recall bloc as a unit in a single vote at the City Council meeting of April 24, 2023¹. It's noteworthy that the City Council Rules and Procedure require that if an issue has multiple parts, those parts must be discussed and voted on separately, individually, if requested. This has been a rule for some time, and this year's rules were adopted on April 10, 2023, at the meeting before the Charter Commission vote². Apparently, none of the Council members had the Rules and Procedures on hand!

This Recall bloc of Charter Commission applicants consisted of Recall principals, a failed Recall bloc City Council candidate, and Recall adherents who, following the City's firing of Police Chief Pohlman, have subjected Red Wing to a divisive and ugly period of rapid-fire vitriol, false claims, and outright lies. There'd been parroting of "Stop the Steal" on the Recall website, local social media groups, and on signs, claiming a right to a recall election with no recognition of the malfeasance threshold, incendiary statements, with veiled and direct threats to City Council members. A result of this vitriol was that one Councilor resigned and another did not seek a second term. Exhibit G, Klitzke's October 1, 2022 Letter. Mayor Wilson supported the Recall as "Democracy in Action." Exhibit H, Wilson-Recall Old-Fashioned Democracy in Action.

Our society has become inured to public lying, falsifying, and "alternative facts." This is not acceptable. I've lost my patience with the Recall City Hall bloc's principals' and adherents' repeated falsehoods. I'm frustrated by the Council's, newspaper's, and the public's failure to call out false statements. The Recall City Hall effort would have disenfranchised those who voted in 2018 and 2022 Council races. Recall misrepresented Open Meeting law and claimed a "right" to a recall election. Recently, I again challenged the Council and Mayor via email to actively call out false statements, in this case, about the Blue Water Farms project. Exhibit I, Overland May 22, 2023 email to Council and Mayor. Ethics was raised in the Red Wing Citizens Assembly in 2017, and before that, Mayor Dennis Egan's resigned in 2013 due to conflict of interest (Exec. Dir. of sand lobbying association when frac sand was on City agenda). I've been pushing for review and upgrade of the City's Code of Conduct for years. Exhibit J, Overland June 4, 2023 email, Upgrade the Code of Conduct. It's been placed on the Council's June 12, 2023 agenda!

III. MAYOR WILSON'S LETTER IS BOTH AMUSING AND DISTURBING

On April 26, 2023, the Charter Commission voted to reappoint me to another term on the Charter

Commission. I received your May 16, 2023 letter on May 25, 2023, which included Mayor Wilson's letter and attachments dated May 3, 2023.

A. Wilson's ex parte letter and attachments were not served.

I was not served with a copy of Wilson's letter to you. I did not receive a copy of Wilson's letter until the email from the City Clerk, 22 days after Wilson's letter of May 3, 2023. I regard Wilson's sending his letter directly to you as ex parte communication. However, I'm not surprised at use of ex parte communication by the Mayor, as there were multiple instances of ex parte communication by Recall proponents to the Goodhue County District Court Judge who was assigned, and who dismissed the Recall City Hall case.³

Prior to a phone call we made to the Court this morning, August 23, Respondents were only aware of one letter sent directly to the Judge, via the Judge's personal court email address, by Kent Laugen, which was made after the dismissal. Court administration advised us this morning that individuals have made multiple ex parte communications with the Court regarding this case. ⁴

Exhibit K, August 23, 2021 - City Atty to Judge Biron, ex parte contact. I observed at least one post on social media asking for Recall participants to contact the Judge directly.

B. Wilson sent his letter "As Red Wing's mayor."

As to the substance of Mayor Wilson's letter, the first paragraph stands out:

As Red Wing's mayor, I am writing to express strong opposition to the reappointment of Carol Overland to our city's Charter Commission. Over the past four years, as a member of that important body, she has exhibited a degree of political partisanship, divisiveness, and undue criticism of others that is totally inconsistent with the commission's mission to carefully and cooperatively review the City Charter and help make decisions that serve our community and its people. Specifically, I refer to the three attached documents.

Mayor Wilson's opening phrase, "As Red Wing's mayor," declares this letter and the statements therein are made under "color of law." I doubt Wilson understands the implication of using that phrase, and I can't imagine that he consulted with the City Attorney before sending this letter. I also doubt that he knows about the potential civil or criminal exposure, since my business and profession is focused on robust advocacy. See Minn. Stat. §609.765.

What is the Mayor's role? The Red Wing Charter establishes that the mayor is only a titular head and head of the City for ceremonial purposes and in cases of emergency. Wilson's May 3, 2023 letter goes beyond his limited charge in our weak mayor system:

Section 2.07 Mayor

The Mayor shall be the titular head of the City. The Mayor may address the Council on any matters of interest. The Mayor shall exercise all powers and perform all duties conferred and imposed upon the Mayor by this Charter, the ordinances of the City, and the laws of the State. The Mayor shall be recognized as the official head of the City for all ceremonial purposes, by the courts for the purpose of serving civil processes, and by the Governor for the purposes of martial law. The Mayor shall study the operations of the City, and make recommendations as he/she believes to be desirable. The Mayor shall review concerns on City activities raised by citizens and make recommendations as he/she believes desirable as to any corrective action(s) necessary. The Mayor shall also report to the Council any neglect, dereliction of duty or waste on the part of any officer or department of the City. The Mayor shall consult with the administrative officer and chief law enforcement official on policy matters affecting public safety within the City.

Please note that Wilson provided no examples of "political partisanship, divisiveness, and undue criticism of others..." on my part. I can and do regularly provide by email and public comment examples of Council's and Mayor's actions against the public interest, the partisanship displayed in this "non-partisan" City venue, and observed divisiveness. I also relay criticisms of abdication of fiduciary responsibility, attempts to circumvent due diligence, openly stated disregard for an MOU with Prairie Island Indian Community, and actions in self-interest. Those are the themes of my emails, my public comments before the Council, and in Letters to the Editor in the newspaper. An example of the Mayor's divisiveness is his newspaper Column of March 8, 2023 supporting the Recall, actively undermining the City Council. Exhibit L, "Red Wing mayor fields questions about police chief's departure," March 8, 2021; and my March 13, 2021 LTE, "An Open Letter to Mayor Mike Wilson," (Editor changed to "Thankful for a Weak Mayor.").

I'm a public interest advocate. I'm a frequent participant in City Council meetings and workshops, either virtually or in person, and have been since I moved to Red Wing in 2000. For decades I've championed increasing public participation, civic transparency, helping others learn public process and feel comfortable about weighing in. I've worked on upgrading rules and procedures for the City Council, at the Public Utilities Commission, and Wisconsin's Public Service Commission, and in DOE and NRC proceedings. I was an active member of the Red Wing's Citizen Assembly, which identified "Public Participation/Better Meetings" and "Update the Code of Conduct" as areas that need work. Updating the Code of Conduct has been a focus of my efforts in Red Wing since at least 2013 and the resignation of Mayor Egan amidst charges of conflict of interest at that time.

I am currently on the Charter Commission. In my time on the Commission have worked to tweak the Charter to raise awareness, transparency, and encouragement of public participation, as well as increasing notice provided to the public of meetings and for timely agendas and packets. Unlike Mayor Wilson, I do not view any of these activities to be partisan, divisive and critical. It is he who, under color of law, is attempting to prevent my reappointment to the Charter Commission, and to quash my freedom to communicate to Red Wing.

Below is an example of my work before the Charter Commission, the one set of changes that I've successfully walked through the Charter Commission. For years, I've advocated for some simple changes in the Charter to enshrine encouragement of public participation, increased

notice, and online posting for transparency. Those changes that I proposed were:

Section 5.03 Council Meetings

On the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following a City General Election, the Council shall hold its organizational meeting after the newly elected officers having qualified take the oath of office and assume the duties thereof. Thereafter, the Council shall meet at such times each month as may be prescribed by ordinance or resolution. The Mayor, the President of the Council, or any three members of the Council may call special meetings of the Council. Notice shall be published in the legal newspaper and on the city website. The Council shall operate with the understanding that public comment is to be encouraged, and each Council meeting shall include a section for general public comment and for comment specific to agenda items at that time on the agenda.

open to the public in the manner provided by State law, <u>full recording shall be archived on city website</u>, and the Council shall not meet in closed or executive session unless allowed by State law.

Section 5.05 Records

The appointed clerical officer shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Council and records shall be posted on the city's website. The votes of Council Members shall be recorded in accordance with law.

In September, 2021, the Charter Commission passed similar simple additions to the Charter, which were forwarded to the Council for their September 27, 2021 meeting, however, because Councilor Klitzke had resigned, it was not possible to pass with a vacancy. I'm hoping the Commission will take them up again and pass on to the City Council for approval.

In December, 2022, there was an effort to eliminate Webex meetings, to which I'd expressed strong objection, and let the Council know. Exhibit M_December 19, 2022 Overland email with letter. Again, I'm working to retain opportunity for remote participation, and thankfully the elimination of virtual meetings did not pass.

In January, there was a similar effort to eliminate the opportunity for the public to comment virtually, which I again opposed, and thankfully the elimination of virtual comment did not pass.

Attached as Exhibit N are a number of emails I've sent to the Council and Mayor. There's nothing partisan or divisive about working to encourage, strengthen, and expand public participation. Trying to eliminate avenues of participation IS divisive.

C. Wilson refers to a statement by ALJ Lipman in prehearing conference, using it to attach the label "Communist."

"As Red Wing's mayor," Wilson refers, without citation, to a statement by ALJ Eric Lipman during the Campaign Finance Board Complaint prehearing conference⁷ that "Red Wing does not need a Commissar." He is utilizing the rhetorical trick of using the unsubstantiated words of anonymous others and a redacted email with a cut and paste, inferring that I'm a Communist! He then notes that for the Commission, the charge is "not 'controlling' public opinion, publicly judging others, or calling their motives into question." That is ironic, as what Wilson is doing is

exactly that. Wilson is inserting his unsubstantiated claims into the realm of public opinion with divisive framing, publicly judging me, calling my motives into question, and most importantly, working to curtail my rights to participate and to prevent my reappointment to the Charter Commission, with no evidence. Wilson needs to revisit the CFB panel's Order, above, finding that ALL the Respondents had violated campaign finance laws and ALL were fined. The panel's Findings of violations of campaign finance law and assessing fines for all seven of the seven Respondents would seem to indicate that Red Wing does need a Commissar.

Wilson also claims that my objections to Charter candidates is "utter disregard for those with whom she disagrees." My comments are not disagreements. Wilson seems to be projecting his tendency to disagree onto me. For example, during the Recall effort, I drafted and mailed a flyer with the City of Red Wing's position, as set out by the City Attorney, copied from the City's website and so cited. See Exhibit N, Overland's Flyer. I received a call from Mayor Wilson, angrily demanding to know who received this flyer (public information), where I got the list (public information), who paid for it (far below the reporting threshold), and finally, in what I interpreted to be an attempt to intimidate, insisting that I never mail anything to his home address.

Mayor Wilson is working to curtail my rights to participation as a resident and citizen, and in this case, he is specifically trying to prevent my reappointment to the Charter Commission.

D. Wilson's claim that my email illustrates disregard for those who disagree is spurious.

My email of April 24, 2023, sent prior to the Council votes on applicants, provided specific examples of why certain applicants should not be members of the Charter Commission. These candidates are either not qualified or should be disqualified. The email calls into question an applicant's fitness for the position and show why others applying are better candidates. Due to the statements in Wilson's letter, I'm providing a few examples.

Tom Drazkowski's application⁹ states:

Please briefly explain your interest in serving on this board or commission

I have had experience in boards as stated in my resume. Throughout the last 10 years I have looked at and evaluated the RED WING Charter, and feel that I have an understanding of the document.

Drazkowski's appointment should be denied due to the false information, statements presented as facts without evidence, and statements contrary to evidence and the words of the City Charter in a flyer he sent to an estimated 6,500 households, which would include most of the roughly 10,000 registered voters in Red Wing. See Exhibit F, Drazkowski Flyer:

The city-wide recall 18 months ago was successful and certified by our city clerk. The current council was able to avoid a special election by directing the city attorney to threaten both the recall attorney and the recall petitioners with the full legal costs of the city if the lawsuit was lost. This council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding recalls. For a city to threaten its own citizens for exercising their rights is both pathetic and unacceptable.

First, the recall was NOT successful. The Petitioners did not meet the threshold of malfeasance or non-feasance, the Petitions were denied, and a recall election was not scheduled. Second, the City Attorney contacted the Recall attorney and advised him that she planned to bring a motion for sanctions because the case was frivolous. Recall did not meet the threshold standard for a recall election, and when the Petitions were denied, they filed a lawsuit. Recall's attorney withdrew and the judge dismissed the case. ¹⁰ Third, "This Council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding recalls." This sidesteps the malfeasance/non-feasance standard and is contrary case law and the language of the Charter. This is evidence that Drazkowski misinterprets the Charter and should not be appointed to the Charter Commission.

Similarly, Jason Snyder's statements in his application are in line with statements made at the League of Women Voters City Council Candidate Forum¹¹, expressing his misunderstanding and/or misrepresentation of the Charter language. He said:

It doesn't matter why the people wanted a recall election, they wanted a recall election. The City Council did not listen to its citizens. If they want a recall election, the only decision the Red Wing City Council gets to make is when we are going to have the election. It doesn't matter if you want a recall because you don't like the fact that I wear a hat, if you ask for one, I'm going to set a date. 12

There is no "right" to a recall election. The Council's vote to deny the Petitions and not grant a recall election was rightly based on the Petitions' failure to meet the threshold of malfeasance or non-feasance. Snyder's Charter Commission application stated:

Please briefly explain your interest in serving on this board or commission

I want to ensure that the City Charter aligns with our State and Federal Constitutions and that the people have all the power to govern themselves and choose or remove their elected officials as they see fit.

Question applies to multiple boards

What skills and talents will you bring to this board or commission?

I am a creative, outside-of-the-box thinker that can troubleshoot complex situations. I take time to consider all input and have the ability to look at both sides of an issue independently of my own bias. I can envision the big picture and enjoy putting all the pieces together to make something work. I have the ability to read and apply the Constitution as written; the City Charter cannot take away the rights protected by the State and Federal Constitutions. I also have the ability to determine the future consequences if a charter is written poorly.

Snyder has demonstrated he does not have the ability to "apply the Constitution as written" and infers that the City Charter has taken away rights protected by the State and Federal Constitutions, which is not true.

In addition, a recent example published online by Charter Commission applicant Ann Vogel shows disregard for Prairie Island Indian Community and our City's focused efforts to improve relations with PIIC:



Ms. Vogel "fails to see" at a time when the City of Red Wing is very publicly and intentionally working to strengthen our City's relationship with Prairie Island Indian Community, and in particular through a joint effort highlighting He Mni Can ("the bluff"). ¹³ Relationship building activities such as info kiosks, facility installation and repair, meetings, educational presentations, workshops, gatherings, and volunteer activities are occurring regularly, announced in the City newsletter, social meetings, and the newspaper. This is a welcome shift in our City's recognition that we are on native land, and recognition of PIIC as a sovereign nation within our community. Improvement of our relationship with PIIC is the policy of the City and should be respected, not disregarded or undermined. From the City's site about He Mni Can:

The Bluff That's Bridging Two Communities

The issue of painting on He Mni Can [Heh-Meh-NEE-Cha]-Barn Bluff is more than a simple graffiti issue. Today the bluff is becoming a place of healing and connection between the Red Wing community and Prairie Island Indian Community (PIIC), and that is the main reason this issue is significant.

People from all walks of life feel a strong connection to the bluff, and each person has his or her own story, memory, or feeling about this place. But in 2016, as the City worked on the plan for the bluff's future, we learned—and finally began to understand—how sacred the bluff is to the Bdewakantunwan Dakota people of the Prairie Island Indian Community. This is a crucial fact that must not be ignored any longer.

My April 24th email opened with a simple charge:

I hope you'll take a look at each and every Charter Commission application and critique it as if it were a homework assignment.

From what I saw at the April 24, 2023 Council meeting, that review did not happen and there was no discussion of candidates during the meeting. A critique of applications is particularly

important to evaluate when candidates claim to understand the charter and the Constitution, yet state the opposite, i.e., that there is a right to a recall election, or misrepresent open meeting law.

My April 24, 2023 email does not show "utter disregard for those with whom she disagrees." My comments in that email are supported by the primary documents, their applications, and public statements of those who have applied.

E. WILSON FAILS TO NOTE THAT THE ORDER REGARDING OVERLAND AND PUBLIC INTERVENORS NETWORK IS TWENTY YEARS OLD.

Finally, Wilson raises the 2003 Campaign Finance Board Order, regarding me and Public Intervenors Network. As above, I complied with the Order. Perhaps he did not note the date was 2003, twenty years ago.

IV. <u>CONCLUSION: WILSON'S LETTER OF OBJECTION IS ABUSE OF PROCESS</u>

The Charter Commission voted unanimously on April 26, 2023 to reappoint me for another term. Mayor Wilson submitted his ex parte letter on May 3, 2023, after the Charter Commission's vote, in an attempt to block my appointment, to mischaracterize my work, and to generally defame me in my profession. Use of an ex parte letter sent after the Charter Commission voted to reappoint me is perverting the appointment process. Wilson's act undermines the appointment process and the Commission's vote.

For the reasons above, I ask that you confirm the Charter Commission's vote and reappoint me to the Charter Commission. I also request that Tom Drazkowski, Ann Vogel, and Jason Snyder be disqualified and not appointed to the Charter Commission, and that Mayor Wilson be sanctioned as appropriate for his overreach "as Red Wing's Mayor."

V. CONSIDER THE RECOMMENDATION OF REV. DR. RICHARD EICK

Although I've never met Rev. Dr. Richard Eick, his concerns are similar to mine regarding the Council's process and Charter Commission candidate qualification. I support his request that Tom Drazkowski and Jason Snyder not be appointed to the Charter Commission.

- I, Carol A. Overland, after duly affirming, state and depose as follows:
 - 1. I am an attorney licensed in good standing in the state of Minnesota, License Number 254617.
 - 2. Charter Commission appointments are divided between the City Council and the Charter Commission.
 - 3. Four years ago, I was appointed to the Red Wing Charter Commission by the Charter Commission.
 - 4. On April 26, 2023, the Charter Commission voted unanimously to reappoint me to a second term, and forwarded that appointment to the District Court.
 - 5. One week later, on May 3rd, 2023, Mayor Mike Wilson sent a letter regarding my appointment to the Charter Commission, opposing my reappointment.
 - 6. The letter was sent to "Carrie Lennon, Chief Judge, c/o Vanessa Jeske, Goodhue County Court Administrator," and it is stamped "Received, May 11, 2023." I was not served with a copy of this letter.
 - 7. In her letter of May 16, 2023, Judge Lennon requested:

Response from Carol Overland as to her campaign finance violations from the November 8, 2022 election cycle and her April 24, 2023 email to the Council.

- 8. To clarify the record, I was not a candidate in any election in 2022, and had no campaign finance violations from the November 8, 2022 election cycle.
- 9. I was the author of the April 24, 2023 1:38:21 PM CDT, using the City's email to the Council and Mayor, with the subject "Charter Commission Appointments by City Council" at the Council meeting that evening.
- 10. Council Rules and Procedures suggests contacting the City Administrator and emailing prior to 3 p.m. on the day of the Council meeting. I routinely email the Council and Mayor, and I copy the Council Administrator, Kay Kuhlman after learning that she was not privy to those emails sent to the Council and Mayor email. I do try to send my missives at least a few days prior to the meeting to allow for some rumination, but I had other commitments on April 24, 2023, and was not able to get it out days ahead as usual.
- 11. I stand behind the points raised in my email of April 24, 2023, and have provided additional documentation in Exhibits A-O attached. If there are questions and/or additional documentation is desired, I will be happy to provide whatever responsive resources I have or can find.
- 12. Attached as Exhibit A is a true and correct copy of the Complaint I filed on November 11, 2022, as an individual and not in the course of representing any party. This Complaint was against "Recall City Hall" individuals running for Red Wing City Council as a bloc, and entities campaigning for these candidates. This included two organizations, Recall City Hall c/o George Hintz and Paul Kampe, and Citizens for Responsible Govt/Red Wing CRG c/o Tom Drazkowski; and City Council candidates: Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Donald Kliewer, Jason J. Snyder, and Ted Siefert. The Complaint consisted of allegations of campaign law by each of the parties. The ultimate order found each of them had violated campaign law and each of them were fined.
- 13. Attached as Exhibit B is a true and correct copy of the Campaign Finance Board OAH Order, which, again, found each of them had violated campaign law and each of them were fined.
- 14. Attached as Exhibit C is a true and correct copy of the Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board Findings and Order regarding Carol Overland and Public Intervenors Network, Inc. I complied with each of the Order points.
- 15. Attached as Exhibit D is a true and correct copy of a "Certification of Recall Committee" page from submitted "Recall City Hall" petition, with the "250 word statement" that served as the basis for the Recall effort. Each of the six City Council members subject to the Recall effort were named and their Ward identified in the Petitions circulated in their Ward. All of the "Certification of Recall Committee" pages had identical "250 word statements" except for the name of the Council member they were seeking to recall, in this Exhibit,

Laurel Stinson, Councilor at Large. The claimed violations of Open Meeting Law did not occur, and for this reason, the City Attorney recommended the Petitions denied, and the Council did in fact deny the Petitions and no election was scheduled.

- 16. Attached as Exhibit E is a true and correct link to the December 13, 2021 Council meeting where Ernie Stone, a principal of Recall City Hall, stated that "Recall City Hall came because of the firing of Chief Pohlman." (beginning at roughly 1:00:30); and a link to the Recall City Hall webpage via the Wayback Machine (the Recall City Hall page has been scrubbed) with Recall's explanation of the origin of the Recall effort, focused on the firing of Chief Pohlman. Due to the need for a legal justification for the Recall, the "250 word statement" was concocted claiming violations of Open Meeting Law, with the underlying truth, that the Recall was retribution for Pohlman's firing. The Recall website stated clearly that "[t]here are elected and appointed officials here in Red Wing who need to be fired for the good of the community." The atmosphere in Red Wing at this time was extremely toxic, and since, has been less so, but has not returned to a normal give and take, and considered compromise required for functional government, similar to our national political atmosphere.
- 17. Attached as Exhibit F is a true and correct copy of a flyer mailed October 28, 2022, days before the election by Complaint Respondent Drazkowski/Red Wing CRG, and the Campaign Financial Report filed November 10, 2022. The flyer, per Drazkowski, was mailed on October 28, 2022 to 6,500 households in Red Wing at a cost of \$4,620.83, paid for solely by Thomas Drazkowski. The flyer contains much false information and outright lies. The tenor of this flyer is typical of the public comments at Council meetings, Letters to the Editor, quotations in newspaper articles, Mayoral columns, and on the local radio station.
- 18. The flyer is replete with hyperbole, and for example, the first paragraph is false and misleading, as are other statements highlighted in the pdf (not all inclusive):

The city-wide recall 18 months ago was successful and certified by our city clerk. The current council was able to avoid a special election by directing the city attorney to threaten both the recall attorney and the recall petitioners with the full legal costs of the city if the lawsuit was lost. This council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding recalls. For a city to threaten its own citizens for exercising their rights is both pathetic and unacceptable.

The recall was NOT successful, and there was no election. Although they met the number requirement of signatures of 20% of registered voters, the Petitioners did not meet the threshold of malfeasance or non-feasance, and therefore, a recall election was not scheduled. This was explained repeatedly as Recall principals railed at City Council meetings, and ultimately sued the City for failure to set an election. See Goodhue County District Court file 25-CV-21-1564. After the Petitions were denied by the Council and the Recall City Hall lawsuit was served, the City Attorney appropriately contacted the Recall attorney and advised him that she planned to bring a motion for sanctions because they did not meet the threshold standard, and he then withdrew and the judge dismissed the case. Third, "This council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding

recalls." This is contrary to the black letter language of the Charter, and is evidence that Drazkowski misinterprets the Charter and should not sit on the Charter Commission.

FULL DISCLOSURE: I represented "Red Wing VOTERS" and filed a Motion to Intervene, but the suit was withdrawn prior to a hearing on the Motion.

19. Attached as Exhibit G is a true and correct copy of "Irreplaceable guidance," a Letter to the Editor by Andrew Klitzke, former Councilor for Ward 2 who resigned in disgust at the harassment and abusive behavior of the Recall/"Christian" right wing bloc. He did not let the public know of this behavior, and as one of his Ward 2 constituents, I was dismayed to read of his experience. Had I know, had we, his constituents known, he would have found support. Attached also in Exhibit G is my Letter to the Editor, "Focused on stability, progress," stating my frustration with the ugly tenor of city politics, which I now again see reflected in Mayor Wilson's letter of May 3, 2023. I had this to say:

Klitzke's "Irreplaceable guidance" letter was disturbing. Why weren't "hateful, profanity-based messages," played at council meetings? Rather than go public, garnering constituent support, Klitzke was silent and resigned, leaving Ward 2 unrepresented.

Those spewing hate and lies must be exposed and held accountable.

At the League of Women Voters Senate and House forum, and "non-partisan" School Board and council forums, we heard candidates rehash exaggerations, false claims and disinformation. There was little direct challenge of false and misleading statements.

Divisive framing, projection, lies, inflammatory wedges, objections to pandemic emergency actions, claims of election fraud and promotion of the recall effort are unacceptable. The recall rationale of open meeting violations was spurious, and public declarations confirm it was based on Pohlman's firing.

20. Attached as Exhibit H is a true and correct copy of Mayor Wilson's column of May 11, 2021, claiming "Recall petition is old-fashioned democracy in action," supporting the recall. In this letter, he demonstrates an imperfect interpretation of the City Charter and claiming a right to a recall election:

In the end, government reports to the people – not the other way around. If the people decide to recall the City Council, that's their right.

- 21. Attached as Exhibit I is a true and correct copy of a recent email that I sent to the City Council, May 22, 2023, after hearing repeated "misstatements" about a potential development site that the site had been vacant for 17 years which is not true (Osami leased the building starting in 2007 and was later evicted) and that Cannon Falls had made a "firm offer" on the proposal (so jump quickly or lose it) and the Cannon Falls Development Director said that was not true, that Blue Water had failed to provide necessary information.
- 22. Attached as Exhibit J is a true and correct copy of a recent email I sent to the City Council,

dated June 4, 2023, entitled "Strengthen Red Wing's Code of Conduct. I have been visibly promoting a change to the City's Code of Conduct since 2017, and brought it up again because of the behavior of some Council members, appointees, and the Mayor, with the bottom line that "[t]he City Council needs education on fiduciary responsibility, protection of city resources, and public versus private interest. Following this email is a Letter to the Editor, Strengthen the city Code of Conduct, written by my partner Alan Muller and I back in 2017.

- 23. Attached as Exhibit K is a true and correct copy of a letter written by City Attorney Amy Mace regarding ex parte contact by multiple Recall City Hall principals direct to Judge Biron after withdrawal of Recall's attorney and dismissal of the lawsuit by Judge Biron. See Goodhue County District Court file 25-CV-21-1564.
- 24. Attached as Exhibit L is a true and correct copy of Mayor Wilson's column dated March 8, 2021, "Red Wing Mayor Fields Questions About Police Chief's Departure," drawing into question the firing of Chief Pohlman, using the words of others to fan the flames and undermine the Council. City personnel issues are dealt with in closed session.
- 25. Attached as Exhibit M is a true and correct copy of my responsive Letter to the Editor to the Mayor's column above, submitted as "An open letter to Red Wing Mayor Mike Wilson" and changed by the Republican Eagle Editor to "Thankful for Weak Mayor." His March 8, 2021 column is similar in style to his May 3, 2023 letter to Judge Lennon, inciting a loud and angry segment of our City and I felt a need to clarify issues and draw parallels:

Letter: An open letter to Red Wing Mayor Mike Wilson

Do recall, I sent three emails to the City address, distributed to you and the Council. The bottom line was "I thank you for doing your jobs, difficult as it can be." In those emails, I questioned the public letters, petition, and comments regarding Roger Pohlman that implied knowledge of confidential matters, twisting public perception. Because it's a confidential process, insinuations and innuendoes couldn't be refuted. Rep. Haley's interference in city issues, seeking to prevent termination, also alluding to inside information, was as improper as the interference play on the national front seeking to overturn Georgia's election.

In Red Wing, I hear cries of "witch hunt," and "we have only begun to fight" and ugly statements about council members — irresponsible speech in light of our political climate ("credible threat" lockdown of Goodhue County building for refugee resettlement vote last year; Sen. Mike Goggin joining Rep. Steve Drazkowski and others, asking Texas A.G. to add Minnesota to lawsuit and disenfranchise Minnesota voters; Jan. 6 D.C. failed insurrection.).

There's talk of a recall effort of six council members. These words and actions will not change the Pohlman decision. Your column (RE, March 6, 2021) hearkens back to a recent failure to accept election results, and uses the rhetorical gambit of using words of others, words conveying little understanding of the process, i.e., process is confidential, Pohlman was represented by counsel, that it was a lengthy process with iterative opportunities for change. Not one of the supporters' comments you quoted substantively challenged the examples cited in the council's Feb. 19 letter, nor do you make any substantive challenges of your own.

"Remember, if it's important to you, it's important to me."

The flurry of inflammatory charges during confidential proceedings prior to his termination was important enough, concerning enough, that I wrote three missives. And now? It's important to me that decisions of the council be acknowledged, and not undermined. A 6-1 vote is not a close call. That is an "overwhelming majority."

Red Wing has a weak mayor system, with the position being that of a bully pulpit. Using your position for a column of this fomenting tenor is divisive and increases rancor in our community.

In short, based on the information stated in the 2/19 letter, what's been reported in the papers including your words, and a viewing of the short 2/19 council meeting, I support the City Council in its 6-1 decision to terminate Pohlman.

- 26. Attached as Exhibit M is a true and correct copy of a cover email and an extensive letter dated December 19, 2022, laying out the work I've done, the multi-year history of the changes I've proposed, for Council Rules and Procedures, formalized annually, to increase opportunities for public participation, require more notice to the public of meetings including earlier distribution of Council agendas and packets, and posting of City information on the City's website.
- 27. Attached as Exhibit N is a true and correct copy of representative emails that I've sent to the Council, included in my response to demonstrate the "degree of political partisanship, divisiveness, and undue criticism of others; "controlling public opinion, publicly judging others, or calling their motives into question," my "utter disregard for those with whom [I] disagree." The transcript of the February 27, 2023 City Council Meeting is a good example of my, and others, efforts to preserve participation. A surprise Resolution for City Rules and Procedures was unveiled, a Resolution drafted by the "Recall 4" in a private without notice, that cut participation through comment in virtual meetings, to essentially undo progress made in City transparency and accountability. When called on the private meeting where this Resolution was developed, there was pushback, but ultimately admitted that it was a private meeting with no notice, and the proposed Resolution was tabled:

Kliewer: I take offense of the fact that people in the public are under the impression there was a secret meeting, there was an agenda meeting which is an open meeting and to the public, you could have been there if you wanted to, you know when it is, anybody could have been there on this council. This document, we'd received the changes, recommended changes, referred to legal counsel for review, we came back to the agenda meeting, and we went through it line by line and made whatever agreed or disagreed with the, the, with what our legal counsel thought. So there's nothing secretive about it, and it's open for discussion. Talk about it.

Brown: I have never, ever, seen an agenda item that went through line by line review of the resolution, I've never seen that. Never seen that.

Kuhlman: I just want to clarify, it was the Agenda team, but it wasn't as part of the agenda meeting, we did that in a separate meeting.

Kliewer: Yes. OK.

Norton: So it was a separate, not a publicly noticed meeting...then..

Kuhlman: Correct.

Kliewer: I stand corrected.

Norton: We couldn't all attend because it's not a publicly noticed meeting.

28. Attached as Exhibit N is a true and correct copy of the flyer I put together just before the Council denial of the Recall Petitions for a Special Election. It was cut and pasted from the City's website, with added contact information for the Council members and the Mayor, and included an explanation of the Recall process (content attributed at top of first page and bottom of reverse side), with my name as the source of the pages. It was after I mailed this flyer that I had my first encounter with Mayor Wilson, who angrily demanded to know who was sent this flyer, where I got the list, who paid for it, and finally, in what I interpreted to be an attempt to intimidate, insisted that I never mail anything to his home address. Considering that this is publication of the City Attorney's opinion and contact info for our Red Wing electeds, I don't understand the offense.

Further your affiant sayeth naught.

To the Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board:


Attached please find executed Complaint for Violation of the Campaign Finance and Fair Campaign Practices Acts, filing fee, and "attachment" below with the specifics of the Complaint.

This Complaint is regarding coordinated acts, statutory violations including failure to file, reporting errors, and missing and unaccounted for funds of a group of individuals, acting as the Committee to Recall City Hall and Citizens for Responsible Government/Govt (unregistered); and candidates running for City Council as a block: Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Ted Seifert, and Jason Snyder; and Don Kliewer, elected to City Council in August 9, 2022 Special Election.

The specific statutes at issue are: Minn. Stat. §211A.02; Minn. Stat. §211A.05; Minn. Stat. §211A.06; Minn. Stat. §211A.09 and Minn. Stat. §211B.04; Minn. Stat. §211B.06; and Minn. Stat. §211B.17. The most serious violations are of Minn. Stat. §211A.06 regarding the \$5,593.63 missing from the Recall City Hall reports, and Minn. Stat. §211B.06 regarding the multiple false statements in the "Citizens for Responsible Govt" flyer dated October 31, 2022.

I. RECALL CITY HALL

Recall City Hall has failed to account for a significant sum, \$5,593.63 as of its August 10, 2022 Report, \$5,569.96 as of the prior report in November 30 2021. Other specific reporting errors in the Committee's Reports are itemized below. As noted below, principals of Recall City Hall have filed for Red Wing City Council, and are reporting expenses exceeding, and at times grossly exceeding, amounts taken in, and the missing Recall City Hall funds may have been diverted to these candidates or "Citizens for Responsible Government." Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account. Because the "Recall City Hall" principals have run and now been



elected to City Office, specifically Ron Goggin and Janie Farrar, Minn. Stat. §211A.09 and Minn. Stat. §211B.17 FORFEITURE OF NOMINATION OR OFFICE may be applicable.

Recall City Hall, a ballot question committee as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 7c, seeking a recall election for 6 of 7 Red Wing City Council members, filed Campaign Financial Reports dated 3-10-21 to cover 2-25-21 to 3-10-21 and Amended report for that same period dated 3-29-21; 5-31-21 for period 3-10-21 to 5-31-21 and Amended report for that same period dated 11-30-21; 11-31-21 for period dated 6/1/21 to 11-30-21; and 8/10/22 for period from 12-1-21 to 8-10-22. The Campaign Financial Reports as filed, with my blue pen comments and highlighting are attached. Reports as filed are available online: https://www.redwing.org/1062/ 2021 Recall Petitions are also online.¹

Report does not list "Disbursements" listed in itemization and claims "NONE." Report lists large amounts of "Anonymous" donations (Report lists Theodore (Ted) Seifert Ron Goggin, Council candidates as donors.)

3-28-21 Amended Report for period 2-25-21 to 3-10-21

Report does not list "Disbursements" listed in itemization and claims "NONE." Report lists in-kind donation from "Ask Shelley," Ask Shelly Virtual Assistant, LLC, was terminated 4/3/2019 via Statement of Termination

5-31-2021 Report for period 3-10-21 to 5-31-21

Report shows \$9,160.00 cash taken in, prior report shows \$3,620.00 cash on hand, totaling \$13,780.00, less \$7,384.11 equals \$5,395.89 cash on hand, BUT report states cash on hand as \$1,775.89 (this was corrected in Amended filing below). Report lists Janie Farrar, current Council candidate as donor, both cash and in-kind.

11-30-21 Amended Report for period 3-10-21 to 5-31-21

Report corrects missing \$3,620 from cash on hand reported on 5-31-21. Report lists 3/20/21 expenditure of \$200 as "Resource" and IDs this as payment to Kent Laugen, whose law license is "involuntarily restricted by court order." Report totals \$9,858, an additional \$698 that is not listed on original (\$9,160)

11-30-21 Report for period 6/1/21 - 11/30/21 – Certified by Paul Kampe (see Goggin Reports). Report of 5-31-21 states \$5,684.89 cash on hand, \$470.42 cash in, and \$38 disbursed (after accounting for disbursements and refunds of \$327.28 and \$350)

8-10-22 Report for period 12-1-21 to 8-10-22 – Certified by Paul Kampe (see Goggin Reports). Report shows disbursement to New River Assembly, where Recall City Hall meetings were held, and this disbursement may or may not be violation of Minn. Stat §211B.08 Solicitations of Contributions Prohibited; see also Minn. Stat §211B.12, Legal Expenditures.

Report shows disbursement on 7-19-22 of \$300 for "Chamber of Commerce Parade Spot" for Red Wing's River City Days. Upon information and belief, there was no "Recall City Hall" unit in the parade. The Recall City Hall effort ended with the City's denial of Petitions for recall election in May and June 2021, over one year prior.²

II. CITIZENS FOR RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT

Citizens for Responsible Government is an unregistered entity, and is either a "Political Committee" as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 27, or an "Independent Expenditure Political Committee" as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 18a, and which has failed to register with Campaign Finance Board and has failed to file Campaign Financial Reports. Minn. Stat. 211A.05. Citizens for Responsible Government has also failed to keep account of income (unknown) and outgo for expenses such as parade expense and mailing of thousands of flyers.

- Minn. Stat. §211A.09 and Minn. Stat. §211B.17 FORFEITURE OF NOMINATION OR OFFICE may be applicable because the bloc candidates coordinated with Citizens for Responsible Government and three have now been elected to City Office, specifically Don Kliewer, Ron Goggin and Janie Farrar,

Citizens for Responsible Government participated in the August 2022 River City Days parade,

likely using the line-up spot paid for by Recall City Hall (reported in 8-10-22 Report), and upon information and belief, using a truck pulling a cargo trailer owned by Council candidate Jason Snyder with "Citizens for Responsible Government" lettering on the trailer, covered by candidate signs and surrounded by those candidates. None of these candidates reported paying a parade entry fee.

Citizens for Responsible Government mailed at least one flyer to many homes in Red Wing. See attached "The time for removal of the current council has finally arrived!" Removal of the Council was the aim of "Recall City Hall," and those running for City Council seats are ones who donated, via cash or in-kind, to Recall City Hall; walked recall petitions around town; participated at demonstrations at City Hall; and were the public face of the Recall effort documented in media articles and social. See also new articles. 4

Minn. Stat. §211B.06, Subd. 1a. FALSE POLITICAL AND CAMPAIGN MATERIAL.

The flyer sent by "Citizens for Responsible Government" used language, topic headings, and language from the "Recall City Hall" website⁵. The flyer contained inflammatory hyperbole and opinions, but more importantly, it contained many false statements, in violation of Minn. Stat. §211B.06, Subd. 1a. See **Flyer**, attached following Recall City Hall CFB Reports. Examples:

- "The city-wide recall 18 months ago was successful and certified by our city clerk." The Recall Petitions were certified by City Clerk and signatures were gathered, but Petitions were not successful on advice of City Attorney that Petitions did not meet malfeasance and/or misfeasance threshold, Council denied Petitions and did not schedule election.
- "The current council was able to avoid a special election by directing the city attorney to

- threaten both the recall attorney and the recall petitioners with the full legal costs of the city if the lawsuit was lost." The Recall lawsuit was withdrawn and dismissed after notification that a Rule 11 challenge would be filed.
- "This council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding recalls." The Charter "by-laws" do not address recall. Recall is provided for in the City Charter, Sections 6.12 6.17.
- "An overwhelming majority of Red Wing did not want police chief Roger Pohlman fired." Just over 2,000, or 20%, of the registered voters signed petitions for recall, which is far less than "overwhelming," and there is no factual basis for a statement regarding whether a majority of voters did not want Pohlman fired.
- "They ruined his career..." Pohlman was fired on February 19, 2021, and was offered job as Lakefield Police Chief on March 1, 2021, less than two weeks later. See 3-3 and 3-10-21 Lakefield articles attached.
- "After spending nearly \$8,000... City staff then buried this report and refused to share it with the public because it did not support their narrative."
 - O The report referred to was from 2018, and was not the cause of Pohlman's firing three years later. The report is discussed in a disingenuous 3-11-2021 opinion piece, "Telling the full story means knowing the whole story," attached. That the report is confidential, and Todd claims to have a copy, provided by an unnamed individual.⁶
 - o The report was not "buried." Personnel matters are confidential by law, and it is up to the person who is the subject of the matter to disclose or not disclose. Roger Pohlman is the only one who can disclose, and this information is not legally available through a Data Practices Act request.
- "... this council has spent millions of dollars on acquiring real estate projects best left to private sector developers. "[m]illions of dollars" is unsubstantiated and false. The Council President reports under \$1 million in City property purchases:

Fiscal Responsibility

The letter claims this council has spent millions of dollars on acquiring real estate projects. More false statements.

To the best of my knowledge, since in office there have been three significant real estate purchases by the city, and one by the Port.

1- purchase of property at the Riverview Skyway landing as part of the long term Upper Harbor redevelopment plan. This purchase was approximately \$100,000

2-purchase of the Bauer Built property for around \$450,000. This had a few purposes: to support local businesses by providing ample parking in West End during reconstruction and to help attract a developer that would add to the retail, dining, entertainment district of this district, further stimulating the economy.

3-purchase a segment of CP Rail property for \$90,000. This project and the funds had been set aside for that purchase for years before I was even on council. This has been a project in the works since 2005. While it is an expensive project, it will not be completed without state or federal funds. But owning the property is the necessary step in applying for those funds.

4-The Port Authority approved the purchase of a small piece of property near the Maltery building for about \$100,000. This was to ensure that it would be ready to sell to anyone who would want to develop the Maltery building or that corner into a project.

- "... suggested removing the chief would be a good start in healing the community." This is false.
- "The city of Red Wing received a total of about \$3,9 million in COVID Cares ACT money. Prior to distributing any to the private sector who it was intended for, the City siphoned nearly 40% (\$1.2 million) fio City Administration needs." Use by the City was an intended purpose. Id.

During 202 the Port authorized between \$900,000 - \$1,000,000 to small businesses to assist them and their employees during 2020. The City also collaborated with other organizations to purchase and provide for personal protection equipment to help keep businesses, employees, and residents safe.

The letter specifically cites the use of those funds as hazard pay, which was an eligible use of the funds, so I'll focus on that. Here again, they're misleading the reader by making false statements that only brush against the truth.

All City employees adjusted their work schedules and personal lives to ensure city services were maintained: garbage, water, streets, parks, library services, public safety, and all the city functions were all maintained during this time.

Union employees received a 4% lump sum for their work during Covid in 2020.

Non-union employees also received hazard pay compensation - the amount they received was adjusted based on the class/type of work they do. Jobs in grades A-B are more hourly employees and often have more interaction with the public or each other, they received a prorated 4% lump sum. Grade C are middle level management and received 3% of their salary in lump sum. Employees in grades D-F such as department heads and administrators received only 2%.

The flyer closed stating:

Written & produced by Citizens for Responsible Govt. P.O. Box 519, Red Wing, MN 55066 without any candidate involvement or endorsement.

This disclaimer is not the language required by statute, and does not specify whether or not it is an "independent expenditure." Minn. Stat. §211B.04 Campaign Material Must Include Disclaimer.

The photos, new articles, parade activities and flyer shows that these efforts were coordinated, not independent. Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 18. "Recall City Hall," "Citizens for Responsible Government" and current City Council candidates are a close knit group, running as a bloc, a group that has been working in concert, coordinating, for over a year, through the Recall City Hall, the City Council Special Election, and the City Council November 8, 2022 election.

III. CANDIDATES FOR CITY COUNCIL

Candidates Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Ted Seifert, Jason Snyder and Don Kliewer are local candidates as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d, candidates for Red Wing City Council who ran as a bloc in 2022. Janie M. Farrar and Ron Goggin were elected on November 8, 2022, and Don Kliewer was elected in a special election on August 9, 2022. Ted Seifert and Jason Snyder lost their respective contests.⁹

All of the Reports filed by these candidates have deficiencies and errors, some simple addition, some material omissions. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account. Although the amounts in question are not as high as the \$5,593.63 missing funds in the Recall City Hall reports, some are substantial, and Minn. Stat. §211A.09 and Minn. Stat. §211B.17 FORFEITURE OF NOMINATION OR OFFICE may be applicable.

A. Janie Farrar – Elected to Red Wing City Council November 8, 2022

Janie Farrar is a local candidate as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d, and filed Campaign Financial Reports, attached. Reports certified by Josephine M. Schendel. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account.

- Farrar did not report paying a Council filing fee;
- Farrar did not report paying a parade fee to the Chamber of Commerce for the Red Wing River City Days parade;
- Report of 10-28-22 shows self in-kind contributions of \$6,752.55, but in-kind listed as \$6,935.65 with no explanation of different in-kind numbers.
- The numbers reported on her Reports of 7-20-2022, 7-29-2022, and 10-29-2022 do not add up.
- Farrar was principal of the Recall City Hall committee, active in soliciting signatures and presenting as public face of the effort. 10

B. Ron Goggin – Elected to Red Wing City Council November 8, 2022

Ron Goggin is a local candidate as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d, and filed Campaign Financial Reports, attached. Gogin's reports were certified by Paul Kampe, who also certified the Recall City Hall reports. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account.

Ron Goggin did not report paying a Council filing fee or parade fee to the Chamber of Commerce for the Red Wing River City Days parade, and marched in the parade and had his campaign signs displayed on the Citizens for Responsible Government trailer.

- 7-18-22 Goggin Reports a prohibited corporate contribution from Demorett Enterprises Inc in the amount of \$100. Minn. Stat \$211B.15 Corporate Political Contributions.
- 7-18-22 Report shows "N/A" for addresses for 7 contributions.
- 10-29-22 Report does not list employers for the Guerbers.
- 10-29-22 The numbers on this report are significantly off.

Ron Goggin was a principal of Recall City Hall as one of the 5 Petitioners for Recall City Hall

using the name of a Hamline citizen advocacy project, then "Red Wing Citizens Assemble" and then "Red Wing Community News. After the Pohlmans moved to Lakefield, Paul Kampe became the moderator.

C. Don Kliewer – Elected to City Council August 9, 2022

Don Kliewer, elected to Red Wing City Council, in a 2022 Special Election, was a candidate as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d. Don Kliewer ran for the vacant Ward 2 City Council seat and was elected in the august 9, 2022 Special Election. He filed three Campaign Financial Reports, certified by Kliewer.

- Kliewer's 7-15-22 Report shows \$900 in cash raised, \$232 of in-kind contributions, totaling \$1,132, claims expenditures of \$806.60, but states an ending balance of \$900 cash-on-hand. The numbers do not add up, and there is no explanation of the roughly \$320 difference.
- 7-29-22 Report for time period of 7-15-22 to 7-29-22 reports \$876.60 cash contributions, but page 2 shows \$2,008.60.

- 7-29-22 page to shows four of the contributions should have been included on the 7-15-22 Report, totaling \$1,738.60, and that report has not been amended.
- 7-29-22 Report shows 7-12-22 in-kind donation of \$232 which is also listed on page 1 of the 7-15-22 Report.
- 7-29-22 Report page 2 should only include the 7-17-22 contribution of \$200 and arguably the undated \$20 and \$50 cash donations, totaling \$270.
- 7-29-22 Report shows cash contributions received as \$876.60, which apparently represents the 7-8-22 loan of \$806.60 plus the cash donations of \$20 and \$50 that total \$876.60.
- 7-29-22 Report claims \$185 cash-on-hand, which, subtracted from the \$876.60 collected, is \$691.60, yet disbursements for this same period are \$1,012.
- 7-29-22 Report shows total disbursements of \$1,823.60, which is the total of the 7-15-22 and 7-29-22 reports, not the \$1,012 disbursements in the 7-29-22 report time period.
- 7-29-22 Report, based on dates of attachment, disbursements should be corrected.
- 8-12-22 Report shows no cash or in-kind contributions. From the \$185 (erroneously) reported on the 7-29-22 report, with no revenue and \$243.83 expenses on 8-1-22, the balance would be -\$58.83.
- 8-12-22 Report states cash-on-hand is \$106.17, with no explanation.
- Reports of 7-29 and 8-12-22 show contributions of \$2,008.60 and disbursements of \$2,067.43, with apparent balance of \$58.83.

Don Kliewer did not report paying a Council filing fee or parade fee to the Chamber of Commerce for the Red Wing River City Days parade and marched in the parade and had his campaign signs displayed on the Citizens for Responsible Government trailer, and the numbers in his Report do not add up. The Campaign Financial Reports have not been amended. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account.



D. Ted Seifert – lost contest for Ward 4 City Council

Ted Seifert is a local candidate as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d, and filed Campaign Financial Reports, attached. Reports certified by Seifert.

Ted Seifert was a principal of Recall City Hall as one of the 5 Petitioners for Recall City Hall Petitions who also took Petitions door to door soliciting signatures:



Seifert's Campaign Financial Reports are deficient, spending more than was taken in, with no explanation.

- 7-29-22 Report states report covers 5-31-22 to 6-29-22, which appears a simple error.
- 7-29-22 Report shows no income.
- 7-29-22 Report shows \$126 in expenses but no indication of how paid.
- 7-29-22 report total is -\$126.00.
- 10-29-22 Report shows \$100 cash contribution, with \$655.86 in expenses, and no indication how expenses were paid.
- 10-29-22 numbers total -\$555.86
- 7-29-22 and 10-29-22 reports total deficiency of \$681.86

Ted Seifert did not report paying a parade fee to the Chamber of Commerce for the Red Wing River City Days parade, and the numbers on his Reports do not add up. The Campaign Financial Reports have not been amended. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account. Ted Seifert coordinated with Citizens for Responsible Government and marched in the parade and had his campaign signs displayed on the Citizens for Responsible Government trailer. See photos above.

E. Jason Snyder – Lost contest for Ward 3 Council

Jason Snyder is a local candidate as defined by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, Subd. 10d, and filed Campaign Financial Reports, attached. Reports certified by Snyder.

Those Reports have multiple issues:

- 10-4-22 Report states \$150 cash and \$60 in-kind contribution, an \$1,478.71 in Disbursements, a deficit of \$1,337.71 if considering only cash contributions, or if including in-kind contributions, \$1,277.71.
- 10-4-22 Report gives no indication how those disbursements were paid.
- 10-4-22 Report does not show a disbursement matching or totaling the \$60 in-kind donation.
- 10-4-22 Report does not show a disbursement for the City Council filing fee.
- 10-31-22 Report shows \$100 cas and \$143.81 in-kind contributions.
- 10-31-22 Report shows \$1.091.63 in expenses leaving a \$991.63 deficit, or including the \$143.91 in-kind, though no matching disbursement, a \$847.82 deficit.
- 10-31-22 Report does not show a disbursement matching the \$60 in-kind contribution.
- Reports, when subtracting expenses from cash contributions, show a \$2,329.34 deficit, or including in-kind contributions (though no matching disbursements) a \$2,125.53 deficit.

Jason Snyder did not report paying a Council filing fee or a parade fee to the Chamber of Commerce for the Red Wing River City Days parade. Upon information and belief, Jason Snyder is the owner of the truck and trailer used in the Red Wing River City Days and which was labeled "Citizens for Responsible Government" and was covered with signs of the candidates who are the subject of this report. He reports significant expenses paid, over \$1,000 in each report, yet reports only taking in \$150 and \$100. These reports, filed 10-4-22 and 10-31-22, have not been amended. Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account.

As above, this Complaint is regarding coordinated acts, statutory violations including failure to file, reporting errors, and missing and unaccounted for funds of a group of individuals, acting as:

- Committee to Recall City Hall;
- Citizens for Responsible Government/Govt (unregistered); and
- Candidates running for City Council as a bloc:
 - o Janie M. Fararr, elected to Red Wing City Council At-Large on November 8, 2022.
 - o Ron Goggin, elected to Red Wing City Council Wards 1 & 2 on November 8, 2022;
 - o Don Kliewer, elected to City Council in August 9, 2022 Special Election.
 - o Ted Seifert and Jason Snyder, who both lost in the November 8, 2022 election.

The specific statutes at issue, as set forth above, are:

- Minn. Stat. §211A.02 Financial Report
- Minn. Stat. §211A.05 Failure to File Statement
- Minn. Stat. §211A.06 Failure to Keep Account
- Minn. Stat. §211A.09 Forfeiture of Nomination or Office

- Minn. Stat. §211B.06 False Political and Campaign Material
- Minn. Stat. §211B.17 Forfeiture of Nomination or Office

The most serious violations are the \$5,593.63 missing from the Recall City Hall reports, and the multiple false statements in the "Citizens for Responsible Govt" flyer dated October 31, 2022 and that entity's failure to register as a Committee.





The time for removal of the current council has finally arrived!

The city-wide recall 18 months ago was successful and certified by our city clerk. The current council was able to avoid a special election by directing the city attorney to threaten both the recall attorney and the recall petitioners with the full legal costs of the city if the lawsuit was lost. This council blatantly refused to follow the by-laws of the City Charter regarding recalls. For a city to threaten its own citizens for exercising their rights is both pathetic and unacceptable.

We want to see Red Wing flourish with a council that is focused on listening to the will of the people. The citizens of Red Wing are at the top of the city organizational chart. This fact is neglected at every council meeting by Council President Becky Norton and member Dean Hove.

We as citizens deserve a council that will be efficient and fiscally responsible in order to create a town that works. This council has failed on many levels:

- 1. Personal Agendas are not acceptable: An overwhelming majority of Red Wing did not want police chief Roger Pohlman fired. This council refused to listen to the will of the people and fired him without cause. They ruined his career by using him as a pawn to satisfy their personal desires for "Social Justice". After spending nearly \$8,000 of taxpayer money to paint him as guilty, a 3rd party attorney, hired by the council found him completely exonerated of all charges with no evidence supporting the allegations. City staff then buried this report and refused to share it with the public because it did not support their narrative.
- 2. Fiscal Responsibility: Under the reckless leadership of Norton and Hove, this council has spent millions of dollars on acquiring real estate projects best left to private sector developers.
- 3. Wisdom: This council has spent tens of thousands of citizen money on hiring outside consultants for unnecessary studies. Recent examples include \$20,000 for a racial equity advisor from Baltimore who attended two meager Zoom meetings to help spin the local dialogue to declare Systemic racism as a public health emergency and suggested removing the chief would be a good start in healing the community. Secondly, \$30,000 was paid to an outside consultant to study Red Wing's homeless crisis, create a PowerPoint and present it to the council. Reality is on any given evening about 5-6 people need housing in Red Wing.
- 4. Compassion: The city of Red Wing received a total of about \$3.9 million in COVID Cares ACT money. Prior to distributing any to the private sector who it was intended for, the city siphoned nearly 40% (\$1.2 million) for City Administration needs. This included hazard & sick pay to department heads like Kay Kuhlman and others who worked from home. This division of money was approved under the leadership of Norton and Hove. Self-serving at best, morally bankrupt at worst. Red Wing deserves better leadership.

We support Ron Goggin Ward 1& 2, Jason Snyder Ward 3, Ted Seifert Ward 4 and Janie Farrer "At-Large".

Pohiman, who appeared before the council last Monday during the council's special meeting, has years of executive experience in law enforcement and was offered the position by the council at that meeting's end. His letter of acceptance was approved by the council unanimously.

Lakefield has been without a police chief since June 4, 2020, when Andrew Konechne left to take a similar position in Arlington.

The Lakefield City Council offered Roger Pohlman of Red Wing the position of police chief during a special meeting Monday night.

Pohlman spoke before the council Monday, giving a summary of his experience in law enforcement and answering questions from council members about specific aspects of his work.

"I originally grew up in Sioux Valley, graduated in 1981, ended up in active-duty Air Force and, after 10 years, I joined the Grand Forks Police Department and rose through the ranks," Pohlman said.

Pohlman has experience leading law enforcement departments, as he moved to Red Wing and became its chief of police after leaving Grand Forks.

"I held that position for the past eight years," Pohlman said.

Pobliman said he wants to come to Lakefield to finish his career on a strong note and serve a tight-knit community close to home that shares his values.

"I see this as a great opportunity to end my career the way law enforcement should be," Pohlman said. "I believe law enforcement should be community focused.

He got a chance to touch on his experience leading youth programs in Red Wing as well.

"I was a GREAT (Gang Resistance Education and Training) instructor," Pohlman said. "It doesn't tell students what they should or shouldn't do; instead, it teaches people how to make good decisions."

Pohlman received positive feedback about the program from students in Red Wing and said he'd be willing to implement a similar program in Lakefield.

"I believe strongly in the program," Pohlman said. "I think it helps out young people get off on the right foot and make good decisions that last a lifetime."

Council members were impressed with Pohlman's resume and elected to make him the offer after he answered

"I've done my own research, and everything I've come across that I think is credible speaks very highly as a candidate," said council member Brent Pavelko.

Council member Nathan Hall agreed.

"I don't think we're gonna find someone with more experience," Hall said.

Council member Bruce Bakalyar made a motion to offer Pohlman the position, which was seconded by Half and unanimously agreed upon by the council. Pohlman will give his answer in writing after reviewing health insurance information in the coming days.

The world doesn't often surprise me.

In 20-plus years as a journalist, I've seen a lot of weird things, and heard a lot of odd statements from folks. That's part and parcel of conducting interviews with a vast cross-section of humanity.

Even as I spoke to him, Wilson seemed bemused by this.

Here's the thing: If you ask the right people, you'll find what you need to know. I found someone who didn't mind passing along the supersecret report. For a city that had fired Pohlman, I can see why. The report basically debunks the complaint against Pohlman, then goes on to praise his honesty and integrity.

Two weeks ago, I sent a request to the city of Red Wing asking for more information on this subject. Basically, I'm still waiting. Some of the complaints against Pohlman have to do with his attitude toward city council members' suggestions about law enforcement and the timeliness of his responses to their emails.

I'd like to see how the actual emails and the complaints against Pohlman match up. After all, folks are talking about recalling six members of the city council, so I'm guessing there's a big contingent of residents who aren't happy the chief was fired.

I'm still digging for information, because people want answers, and the only way I can find them is to know a lot of information.



Committee outlines work needed to recall Red Wing City Council members

A grassroots recall campaign is planning its steps to bring six of seven council members before a special election.

RED WING — About 75 people showed up Tuesday night to hear leaders of an effort to recall six members of the Red Wing City Council.

George Hintz, who started the occall of or by complaint fled November 198, 2022 the public comment period of a city council meeting in February, said yard signs have been bought, a bank account has been opened and the committee is ready to collect signatures for a petition, which the group hopes to turn over to the city within a few weeks.

"Talk to friends," Hintz advised those in attendance Tuesday at New River Assembly of God Church. 'Ask them to come to the next general meeting."

Hintz, former Red Wing City Council Member Peggy Rehder and Tom Wilder led the discussion about the recall steps taken so far and those that are planned.

The recall effort began as a response to the city council's 6-1 vote on Feb. 19 to fire then-Red Wing Police Chief Roger Pohlman. While Pohlman has moved onto a new job as chief of police in Lakefield, Minn., the city he's left behind is still asking how the city council can justify firing him.

Former Goodhue County Board member Ted Seifert, who ran and lost against City Council President Becky Norton in 2018, said Pohlman was the right man for the job.

"I couldn't think of anybody better to be chief of police in Red Wing

than Roger Pohlman," Seifert said. "When the City Council fired him Ex A_Overland CFB Complaint filed November 11, 2022 well, they're going in the wrong direction."

But Seifert said there are other concerns that show the council needs to be replaced before it does more harm. He cited the "bridge to nowhere" pedestrian bridge near Old Main Street and said the council is trying to mirror recent moves by the Minneapolis City Council.

"They have an agenda, and I don't think it's an agenda that works well in Red Wing," Seifert said.

Rehder said the next step in the recall effort is to write up 250-word complaints against each member of the city council that will outline their malfeasance or nonfeasance on the job, a statutory requirement.

Violations of the state's open meeting law, she said, is just one of the counts of malfeasance that works against the City Council members.

Other members of the audience said that firing Pohlman puts the city at risk since his job is now being done by a captain who still performs his own duties along with the chief's duties. Others complained that the whole process was done in secret without any input from the public.

During the meeting Tuesday there were several calls to action and requests for volunteers. For example, Rehder said the committee will likely need to raise funds for legal battles if the city or individual council members contest the validity of the petitions – either the signatures gathered during the two petition phases, or whether the charges meet the definition of malfeasance. Rehder asked for a volunteer to lead fundraising efforts for the committee.

"One of my big concerns is this is going to be pretty expensive," Rehder said. "We will be challenged by these council members in court."

Others suggested more grassroots efforts such as getting individuals to

recall movement during public comment periods, and writing letters to the editor to outline why the group wants to recall the six council members.

According to the Red Wing City Charter, there are several steps to the recall process. The first is for at least five registered voters from the ward (or whole city for at-large candidates) to bring a petition containing a 250-word statement of the grounds for removal to the city.

Once that petition is approved, the group has 30 days to collect signatures of 20 percent of registered voters from the last election in the ward (or whole city for at-large candidates) to force the recall of a specific candidate.

If the second petition and signatures are valid, the city would set a recall election between 45 and 60 days from that point.

Despite the hurdles, Wilder said he's ready, and from the phone calls he receives, he believes residents of Red Wing want this recall to happen.

"City Hall isn't concerned, City Hall doesn't think it's real," Wilder said.
"But I get phone calls every day asking what this group has done."

FINDINGS OF FACT, CONCLUSIONS OF LAW, AND ORDER

VS.

Recall City Hall, Citizens for Responsible Government, Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Donald Kliewer, Ted Seifert, Jason J. Snyder

This Fair Campaign Practices complaint (Complaint) is pending before the following panel of three Administrative Law Judges: Eric L. Lipman (Presiding Judge), James E. LaFave, and Kristien R. E. Butler (Panel).

This matter was submitted to the Panel based upon the record from the probable cause hearing and the underlying written record; which includes the Complaint, the Prima Facie Determination, the Probable Cause Order, and final written argument. The record closed on January 20, 2023.

Carol A. Overland, the Complainant, appeared on her own behalf and without counsel. Paul Kampe, Founder, appeared on behalf of the Recall City Hall committee. Thomas Drazkowski, Organizer, appeared on behalf of the Citizens for Responsible Government committee. Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Donald Kliewer, Ted Seifert, and Jason J. Snyder, each appeared on their own behalf and without counsel.

STATEMENT OF THE ISSUES

- 1. Did Complainant demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that the Respondents, in their separate campaign finance reports, failed to report correct amounts, as required by Minn. Stat. § 211A.02, subd. 2 (2022)?
- 2. Did Complainant demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that the Respondents, in their separate campaign finance reports, failed to report correct amounts "with the intent to conceal receipts or disbursements" or "the purpose of receipts or disbursements," in violation of Minn. Stat. § 211A.06 (2022)?

- 3. Did Complainant demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that the Respondents failed to include proper disclaimers on campaign material in violation of Minn. Stat. § 211B.04 (2022)?
- 4. Did Complainant demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent Goggin, accepted a prohibited corporate contribution in violation of Minn. Stat. § 211B.15, subd. 2 (2022)?
 - 5. If any violation was established, what penalty is appropriate?

SUMMARY OF CONCLUSIONS

The Complainant, Ms. Overland, established that Respondents, in their separate campaign finance reports, failed to report contributions and disbursements accurately. Ms. Overland did not, however, establish that the misreporting was done deliberately to conceal the nature of those amounts.

Ms. Overland established that Respondent Citizens for Responsible Government circulated campaign material in support of certain candidates for local office, that was created independently of those candidates, but did not include a proper disclaimer.

Lastly, Complainant did establish that Respondent Goggin accepted a prohibited corporate contribution in violation of Minn. Stat. § 211B.15, subd. 2.

The Panel concludes that monetary penalties, as imposed separately below, are appropriate for these violations.

Based upon the record and proceedings herein, the undersigned Panel of Administrative Law Judges makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Respondents Janie M. Farrar, Ron Goggin, Ted Seifert and Jason J. Snyder were each candidates for election to the City Council of Red Wing, Minnesota, in the General Election on November 8, 2022. Respondent Don Kliewer was elected to the Red Wing City Council at a Special Election held on August 9, 2022.¹
- 2. Respondent Recall City Hall is a political committee that supported recall of incumbent members of the Red Wing City Council in 2021 and through the Special Election in 2022.²
- 3. Respondent Citizens for Responsible Government is the political committee that advocated for election of Ms. Farrar and Messrs. Goggin, Seifert and Snyder to the Red Wing City Council in the November 2022 General Election.³

Campaign Finance Reporting Obligations Under Minn. Stat. §§ 211A.06, 211A.06

- 4. The hearing record establishes that each of the Respondents Recall City Hall, Citizens for Responsible Government, Ms. Farrar and Messrs. Goggin, Seifert and Snyder filed campaign finance reports between 2021 and 2022 that did not accurately state the nature of the contributions received or disbursements made.⁴
- 5. Each of the Respondents made reporting errors and was obliged to file an amended report that retabulated and restated the contributions received and disbursements made.⁵
- 6. It is clear from the hearing record that the reporting obligations for Respondents were undertaken by local volunteers who did not have strong backgrounds in either accounting or campaign finance reporting before making the filings. The best understanding of the evidence in the hearing record is that the reporting errors were unintentional.⁶
- 7. Ms. Overland did not establish by a preponderance of the evidence that any of the misreported detail was submitted with the intent to "conceal receipts or disbursements" or "the purpose of receipts or disbursements..."

Disclaimer Practice Under Minn. Stat. § 211B.04

- 8. In October of 2022, Thomas Drazkowski, operating as the organizer of the Citizens for Responsible Government, circulated a mailer that urged the election of Respondents Farrar, Goggin, Seifert and Snyder.⁸
- 9. Citizens for Responsible Government prepared and circulated 6,500 copies of the mailer, which, among other matters, asserted that it was:

[W]ritten [and] produced by Citizens for Responsible [Government] P.O. Box 519 Red Wing, MN 55066[,] without any candidate involvement or endorsement.⁹

10. Minn. Stat. § 211B.04, subd. 2, requires the following disclaimer be placed on written campaign material that follows from an independent expenditure:

This is an independent expenditure prepared and paid for by (name of entity participating in the expenditure), (address). It is not coordinated with or approved by any candidate nor is any candidate responsible for it.¹⁰

- 11. The October 31, 2022, mailer developed by Thomas Drazkowski and Citizens for Responsible Government did not include the disclaimer text required by Minn. Stat. § 211B.04, subd. 2.¹¹
- 12. Likewise, for the first time in her response papers, Ms. Overland asserts that the disclaimer used by the Citizens for Responsible Government was defective, because mail sent to the referenced Post Office Box in November of 2022, was returned as undeliverable. ¹² In light of its holding in Finding 11, finding the disclaimer defective, the Panel does not reach the question of whether the Post Office Box was operational at the time the campaign literature was circulated.
- 13. Ms. Overland maintains for the first time in her response papers that Respondents Farrar, Goggin, Kliewer, Seifert and Snyder failed to have proper disclaimers on their respective lawn signs, in violation of Minn. Stat. § 211B.04. Yet, these claims were not pled in her original Complaint.¹³
- 14. Even if those claims had been properly included in the Complaint, the photographs referenced by Ms. Overland¹⁴ do not establish that the lawn signs depicted in those photos did not have the required disclaimers.

Receipt of Prohibited Contributions Under Minn. Stat. § 211B.15

- 15. In the Complaint, Ms. Overland asserted that Mr. Goggin's receipt of a \$100 campaign contribution from Demorett Enterprises, Inc., violated Minn. Stat. § 211B.15.¹⁵
- 16. Under Minn. Stat. § 211B.15, subd. 2, a "political party, organization, committee, or individual may not accept a contribution" from a corporation "to promote or defeat the candidacy of an individual for nomination, election, or appointment to a political office."¹⁶
- 17. The claim is uncontested, although Mr. Goggin notes that when the error was called to his attention, the contribution was promptly returned to Demorett Enterprises, Inc.¹⁷

Based upon the foregoing Findings of Fact, the undersigned Panel of Administrative Law Judges makes the following:

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. The Panel is authorized to consider this matter pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 211B.35 (2022).
- 2. As the Complainant, Ms. Overland bears the burden to prove the claimed violations of Chapters 211A and 211B by a preponderance of the evidence.¹⁸
- 3. Ms. Overland demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence that the Respondents, in their separate campaign finance reports, failed to report correct amounts, as required by Minn. Stat. § 211A.02, subd. 2.
- 4. The Panel concludes that the accounting errors in the various reports were "negligent, ill-advised and ill-considered," although likely had little impact upon the voters of Red Wing, Minnesota.¹⁹
- 5. Ms. Overland did not, however, establish that the misreporting was done deliberately to conceal the nature of those amounts.²⁰
- 6. Minn. Stat. § 211A.06 does not penalize merely inaccurate record-keeping; it penalizes the failure to keep correct accounts of money received for a committee with "the intent to conceal receipts or disbursements," or the "purpose of receipts or disbursements." The focus of a section 211A.06 claim, therefore, is on whether a candidate or committee intentionally kept inaccurate accounts to conceal the source or purpose of contributions or disbursements.²¹
- 7. Under such circumstances, the Panel concludes that the resulting penalty for the reporting errors (under Minn. Stat. § 211A.02) is \$50 for each Respondent.
- 8. The disclaimer requirements for those undertaking independent expenditures (under Minn. Stat. § 211B.04, subd. 2) are more demanding than the disclaimer requirements for persons or candidate committees circulating campaign material under Minn. Stat. § 211B.04, subd. 1. Independent expenditures must include the exact text of the required disclaimer, and not merely language that is "substantially similar."²²

- 9. Because the October 31, 2022, mailer circulated by Citizens for Responsible Government did not include the exact disclaimer text required by Minn. Stat. § 211B.04, subd. 2, imposition of a penalty is appropriate.²³
- 10. The Panel concludes that the failure to use the text required by the statute was "negligent, ill-advised and ill-considered," but likely had little impact upon the voters of Red Wing, Minnesota.²⁴
- 11. Under such circumstances, the Panel further concludes that the resulting penalty for the disclaimer error on a mailer that was circulated to 6,500 potential voters is \$200.
- 12. Ms. Overland established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent Goggin violated Minn. Stat. § 211B.15 by receiving a \$100 campaign contribution from Demorett Enterprises, Inc.
- 13. The Panel concludes that the failure to carefully examine contribution checks before depositing them was "negligent, ill-advised and ill-considered," but because it was a modest amount and promptly returned, had little discernable impact upon the electoral process.²⁵
- 14. Under such circumstances, the Panel further concludes that the resulting penalty for the reviewing error is \$50 half of the contributed amount.

Based upon the record herein, and for the reasons stated in the following Memorandum, the Panel makes the following:

ORDER

- 1. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Recall City Hall committee shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 2. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Citizens for Responsible Government committee shall pay a civil penalty of **\$250** for violating Minn. Stat. §§ 211A.02, 211B.04, subd. 2.
- 3. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Farrar shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 4. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Goggin shall pay a civil penalty of **\$100** for violating Minn. Stat. §§ 211A.02, 211B.15.
- 5. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Kliewer shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.

- 6. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday**, **February 24**, **2023**, Respondent Seifert shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 7. By **4:30 p.m.** on **Friday, February 24, 2023**, Respondent Snyder shall pay a civil penalty of **\$50** for violating Minn. Stat. § 211A.02.
- 8. The penalties shall be paid by check made to the order of: "Treasurer, State of Minnesota," and remitted to the Office of Administrative Hearings. The docket number OAH 8-0325-38828, should be included on the check.

NOTICE

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 211B.36, subd. 5 (2022), this is the final decision in this case. Under Minn. Stat. § 211B.36, subd. 5, a party aggrieved by this decision may seek judicial review as provided in Minn. Stat. §§ 14.63-.69 (2022).

MEMORANDUM

In order to encourage greater care by candidates and committees in the development of campaign literature and reporting of campaign finances, the Panel concludes that some penalty should be imposed for the violations in this matter.

To ensure consistency in the application of administrative penalties across types of violations of the Fair Campaign Practices Act, the Office of Administrative Hearings

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uses a "penalty matrix" to guide decision-making in such matters.²⁶ The matrix categorizes violations based upon the willfulness of the misconduct and the impact of the violation upon voters.²⁷ It reads as follows:

Willfulness	Minimal/no impact on voters, easily countered	Some impact on several voters, difficult to correct/counter	Many voters misled, process corrupted, unfair advantage created
Deliberate, multiple violations in complaint, history of violations, clear statute, unapologetic	\$600 - 1,200	\$1,200 - 2,400 and/or Refer to County Attorney	\$2,400 - 5,000 and/or Refer to County Attorney
Negligent, Ill-advised, Ill-considered	\$250 - 600	\$600 - 1,200	\$1,200 – 2,400 and/or Refer to County Attorney
Inadvertent, isolated, promptly corrected, vague statute, accepts responsibility	\$0 - 250	\$400-600	\$600 - 1,200

Because every case is unique, however, the Panel may depart from the presumptive penalty listed in the matrix.²⁸

In the view of the Panel, the matrix phrases that best describe the misconduct in this case was "negligent, ill-advised and ill-considered," and that the shortcomings had little impact on the electoral process or the choices of voters. The careful balancing in this opinion best supports the purposes of the Fair Campaign Practices Act.

FINDINGS IN THE MATTER OF A COMPLAINT REGARDING CAROL OVERLAND AND PUBLIC INTERVENORS NETWORK, INC.

Procedural Background

On April 30, 2003, John Reinhardt ("Complainant"), filed a complaint with the Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board ("Board") alleging that Carol Overland ("Respondent") violated Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 10A.

The Complainant provided documents related to MPUC Docket No. E002/CN-01-1958 and OAH Docket No. 15-2500-14699-2 in support of his complaint. The Complainant alleged that these documents verified that Public Intervenors [sic] Network, Inc. received funding from outside sources. The Complainant noted that these outside sources were not disclosed on Ms. Overland's Lobbyist Disbursement Report for the period covering January 1, 2002, through June 30, 2002.

By letters dated May 1, 2003, and May 19, 2003, the Respondent was notified of the complaint and afforded an opportunity to respond. Ms. Overland responded on May 27, 2003, and stated that the McKnight Foundation provided a \$35,000 grant to Public Intervenors Network, Inc. that was used to intervene in a certificate of need proceeding before the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission. Ms. Overland provided the Board with a copy of Public Intervenors Network, Inc.'s grant agreement with the McKnight Foundation, dated April 21, 2002.

The Board considered this matter in executive sessions on May 28, 2003, and June 25, 2003. The matter was considered based on the complaint, the documents accompanying the complaint, the response, the documents accompanying the response, and information obtained from the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission's website.

Based on the record before it, the Board issues the following:

Evidentiary Findings

- 1. Carol Overland registered with the Board as a lobbyist for Public Intervenors Network, Inc. on November 14, 2002.
- Carol Overland and Public Intervenors Network, Inc. used funds obtained from the McKnight Foundation to influence a certificate of need proceeding under Minn. Stat. §216.B.243, which is defined as an administrative action by Minn. Stat. §10A.01, subd. 2.

- Minn. Stat. §10A.04, subd. 4, (d) requires that a lobbyist disclose each original source of funding in excess of \$500 used for the purpose of lobbying to influence legislative action, administrative action, or the official action of a metropolitan governmental unit.
- 4. Minn. Rules 4511.0100, subp. 5, defines an original source of funds as "a source of funds, other than the entity for which a lobbyist is registered, paid to the lobbyist, the lobbyist's employer, the entity represented by the lobbyist, or the lobbyist's principal, for lobbying purposes.

Based on the above Statement of the Evidence, the Board makes the following:

FINDINGS CONCERNING PROBABLE CAUSE

There is probable cause to believe that Public Intervenors Network, Inc. used funds obtained from the McKnight Foundation to influence administrative action. Ms. Overland did not disclose receipt of these funds on her Lobbyist Disbursement Report for the period covering January 1, 2002, through June 30, 2002.

Based on the above Findings, the Board issues the following:

ORDER

The Board directs Carol Overland to amend her Lobbyist Disbursement Report for Public Intervenors Network, Inc. for the period covering January 1, 2002, through June 30, 2002, to disclose the name and address of all original sources of funding, as required by Minn. Stat. 10A.04, subd. 4, (d).

The amended Lobbyist Disbursement Report must be submitted to the Board within 30 days of the date that these findings are signed by the Board Chair.

The record in this matter and all correspondence is hereby entered into the public record in accordance with Minn. Stat. §10A.02, subd. 11. Board staff shall provide copies to Mr. Reinhardt and Ms. Overland.

State funding unlocks deal with Minneapolis to sell Roof Depot site for urban farm

Legislative support brings a breakthrough for the East Phillips activists who opposed the city's plans to expand its public works campus on the site.

Protestors interrupted a Minneapolis City Council meeting last fall, calling for a chance to speak against the demolition of the Roof Depot building.

The Legislature has delivered a breakthrough for East Phillips environmental activists in their long fight to block Minneapolis' plans to build a public works facility at the site of the former Roof Depot warehouse, according to the House DFL Caucus.

Ex I 5-22-2023 Stop Lying

A \$4.5 million grant to relocate the public works project, and \$2 million earmarked for a down payment on purchase of the site by the East Phillips Neighborhood Institute (EPNI), a group of residents that wants to redevelop the site into an urban farm, were included in the capital investment and tax bills that passed this weekend.

The EPNI must still satisfy a set of conditions, including repaying \$16.7 million that the city has already spent on pre-development work.

EPNI board president Dean Dovolis celebrated the deal as a "dramatic" détente in the nearly 10-year impasse between the city and the neighborhood, which has involved multiple environmental <u>lawsuits</u> and <u>protests</u> to avert <u>demolition</u> of the Roof Depot.

"I credit the intelligence and genius of the community," said Dovolis, of DJR Architecture. "They've managed to structure this deal, create the vision, outnegotiate Minneapolis, get the legislative support for it and wide community involvement."

In a statement, Mayor Jacob Frey expressed gratitude to legislators and state officials for the deal, which he said would ensure clean water for the city and its residents.

"This agreement would move us closer to that goal, address community wishes, and avoid double-charging Minneapolis property taxpayers," he said.

City officials have been planning to expand the south Minneapolis public works campus on the Roof Depot site — consolidating water maintenance staffers, vehicles and equipment in one central location.

Details of the deal were outlined in a letter from Frey and City Council Member Andrew Johnson, chair of the city's intergovernmental relations committee. It states that the city will sell the Roof Depot site for the purpose of becoming an urban farm at its current assessed value of \$11.4 million if:

- EPNI privately raises \$3.7 million half of the \$11.4 million minus the \$2 million deposit —by September 8.
- The state grants the other half of the site's assessed value \$5.7 million to the city next year, along with additional funds to repay the \$16.7 million that the city has already spent on its project.
- Minneapolis is not required to pay for further project management or environmental remediation on the site.

EPNI, its allies and investors are now making plans to raise that \$3.7 million before the September deadline. They are also planning a block party for June 4, said Dovolis.

"With a third of East Phillips residents living below the poverty line, the community is in great need of affordable housing, investment in jobs and infrastructure, and sustainable development," said Rep. Hodan Hassan, DFL-Minneapolis, in a statement. "While this project will be a long road, I'm thankful we were able to make progress on this investment in our community. I am confident the vision for the Roof Depot will one day become a reality."

Business opportunity

Red Wing is poised to lose yet another amazing business opportunity.

For two years Blue Water Farms (bluewaterfarmswall-eye.com) has sought to bring a fully integrated aquaponic walleye farm to the former Dover Industry property on the corner of Highways 19 and 61.

Regrettably the Red Wing Port Authority has been cool to the project from the beginning. This project proposal has sat in a subcommittee of the Port and the entire Port Authority has never had the opportunity see a full presentation of the proposal from the company.

At the last Council meeting I attended, I was prepared to comment on the need for update of the City's Code of Conduct, but the public comment period was shifted to comment on the Blue Water Farms agenda item (which I wasn't really prepared for!)(procedurally, I think it would have been better to hold comment on this when item was called and prior to closing the meeting). As time goes by, the need for revision of the Code of Conduct is increasingly apparent.

Six years ago this month, Alan and I submitted the Letter below to the bEagle. Strengthening the City's Code of Conduct was one of the priorities identified by the **Red Wing Citizens Assembly**. That was <u>six</u> <u>years ago</u>, and nothing has happened, the Code of Conduct has not been updated. Mayor Dennis Egan resigned a decade ago due to an blatant conflict of interest, and yet the Code of Conduct has not been updated. Why? What's the hang up?

I've offered the Public Utilities Commission Code of Conduct to the Citizens Assembly and the Council as an example of the sort of provisions needed, and offer again to you:

In particular, examples of PUC's Code of Conduct that the City should rework as needed and incorporate:

7845.0400 CONFLICT OF INTEREST; IMPROPRIETY.

- Subpart 1. **General behavior.** A commissioner or employee shall respect and comply with the law and shall behave in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the commission's decision making process.
- Subp. 2. **Actions prohibited.** Commissioners and employees shall avoid any action that might result in or create a conflict of interest or the appearance of impropriety, including:
 - A. using public office for private gain;
 - B. giving preferential treatment to an interested person or entity;
 - C. impeding the efficiency or economy of commission decision making;
 - D. losing independence or impartiality of action;
 - E. making a commission decision outside official channels; and
 - F. affecting adversely the confidence of the public in the integrity of the commission.

7845.0700 PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES. (selected)

- Subp. 3. **Interests in utilities.** A commissioner or professional employee shall not invest in a public utility or telephone company, acquire a legal or equitable interest in it, however small, become its director or advisor, or actively participate in its affairs. This prohibition does not apply to:
- Subp. 5. **Insider information.** A commissioner or employee shall not directly or indirectly use, or permit others to use, information not made available to the general public, to advance a private interest.

We have seen the active participation in lobbying for Blue Water Farms, heard demonstrably false statements being bandied about by some Council and Port members and the mayor regarding Blue Water Farms (i.e., "17 long years" and "firm offer from Cannon Falls" and that other cities are interested) and apparent use of inside information as some statements made are not in the public realm; the willingness to subvert and circumvent established due diligence process; the disregard for our City's MOU and work with Prairie Island Indian Community to improve relationship with PIIC; and Mayoral lobbying for new roof of his Marine Engine Museum despite default on lease and contrary to lease provision that lessee is responsible for all maintenance and repairs; and recent letter sent to Chief Judge Lennon under color of law "[a]s Red Wing's Mayor" and without service on party; the thankfully failed attempts to eliminate virtual meetings and then virtual comments; the attempts to reject grants and budgeted public expenditures for public projects which would stop those projects and harm the city's future requests, contrary to the Council's fiduciary responsibility; these examples are more than sufficient to support review and updating of the City's Code of Conduct.

The last sentence of our letter below is particularly important:

The City Council needs education on fiduciary responsibility, protection of city

resources, and public versus private interest.

So... once more with feeling... STRENGTHEN THE CITY CODE OF CONDUCT!

As a member of the Red Wing Citizens Assembly, I'm thinking more formally about public policy. As frequent participants in local issues, representing groups and members of the public, and as individual residents, Alan and I are particularly interested in Red Wing's Code of Conduct. It's a company town in many ways, with undue corporate influence.

Compared to that of the Public Utilities Commission where I practice (Minn. R. Ch. 7845), Red Wing's Code of Conduct is inadequate. Under PUC Code, commissioners "shall behave in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the commission's decision-making process," and prohibits "... any action that might result in or create a conflict of interest or the appearance of impropriety...." Red Wing's Code gives too much wiggle room.

Remember removal of Mayor Dennis Egan? Why was resignation even a question given the direct conflict of interest and sand issues on the city agenda at the time?

How many City Council members are financially connected to Xcel Energy, as employee, contractor or with business ties? Xcel matters are regularly before the council, i.e., LabUSA "ash mining" (Full disclosure: I represented in limited scope neighbors challenging that project), nuclear issues, utility personal property tax revenue, and the city's legislative agenda. How does the city balance Red Wing's interests with Xcel's interests?

3M/Capitol Safety agreed to create 40 new jobs in exchange for a \$500,000 state MIF Loan and \$284,677, 100 percent city tax abatement, for the new building. 3M didn't comply by the deadline, nor within the three-month grace period, and now they're six months overdue. The public is paying over \$19,000 per job, Red Wing's

share over \$7,000 per job. The council granted an extension without penalty, with no disclosure of how many jobs 3M fell short. 3M is moving jobs around - why not to Red Wing? Shouldn't tax be assessed during noncompliance, not abated? An "extension fee" of at least \$19,000 per job not created by the deadline? How is extension, with no consequence, in the public interest?

These are just a few examples. A few thoughts for improvement:

- The Red Wing Code of Conduct should require full disclosure of employment and contracting ties, in campaign information and city website biography. For each agenda item with a potential conflict, council and commission members should be queried via roll call about conflicts and interests with their response on the record.
- The administrator's council packet should review for each agenda item the "city interest," "applicant interest" and "public interest" for consideration.
- The Code of Conduct should require full disclosure and recusal from discussion and decision of any council or commission member who is employee or contractor or has business dealings with a party to an agenda item.
- The City Council needs education on fiduciary responsibility, protection of city resources and public versus private interest.

City of Red Wing, revise the Code of Conduct. Give it some teeth.

We represent the City of Red Wing and all named Respondents in the abovereferenced case. The purpose of this correspondence is to request that if the Court is considering reversing its dismissal of this matter that Respondents have an opportunity to respond to any ex parte communications about this case before any decision is made.

Currently, we are aware that the public docket provides that this case has been dismissed without prejudice. Prior to a phone call we made to the Court this morning, August 23, Respondents were only aware of one letter sent directly to the Judge, via the Judge's personal court email address, by Kent Laugen, which was made after the dismissal. Court administration advised us this morning that individuals have made multiple ex parte communications with the Court regarding this case. We also learned that the Court may be considering the best way to proceed in light of receiving such communications.

'THE MAYOR IS IN': RED WING MAYOR FIELDS QUESTIONS ABOUT POLICE CHIEF'S DEPARTURE

With COVID and so much else going on, it takes a lot to get people any more worked up and worried than they already are. But I'm really getting an earful about the City Council's decision to fire our now former police chief, Roger Pohlman.

Red Wing citizens are calling, emailing, and stopping by my Third Street office. They are puzzled about the process, or lack of it, and furious about the outcome.

From what I see and hear, community support for him is overwhelming. In fact, I've received exactly two – yes, just two – emails from people who thought the

council made the right decision. That's it. Checking my notes from folks who have stopped by the office, called, or emailed, these points come up again and again."

"The chief didn't get a fair shake."

"What ever happened to due process? Why weren't citizens allowed to speak at the council meeting?"

"Why wasn't Chief Pohlman allowed to attend and speak in his own defense? What kind of a kangaroo court is the council running?"

"Chief Pohlman treated people with respect, honesty, and kindness. I can't believe what they did."

"Looks like they had their own agenda and fired him for reasons that remain secret. Why weren't citizen taxpayers allowed to weigh in?"

You get the idea. And when I met with members of our police force, to a person they expressed support and admiration for Pohlman. Quite frankly, I'm concerned about morale on the force, and about our ability to keep the top flight cops who have served Red Wing so well.

I'm also hearing plenty about what some are calling the taxpayer funded, multimillion dollar proposed "Bridge to Nowhere" that would link Bay Point Park to West End businesses. More on that later.

My LTE is in the paper today, on hearing him say he got only 2 emails supporting Pohlman's firing, and that an "overwhelming majority" was in an uproar:

Do recall, I sent three emails to the City address, distributed to you and the Council. The bottom line was "I thank you for doing your jobs, difficult as it can be." In those emails, I questioned the public letters, petition, and comments regarding Roger Pohlman that implied knowledge of confidential matters, twisting public perception. Because it's a confidential process, insinuations and innuendoes couldn't be refuted. Rep. Haley's interference in city issues, seeking to prevent termination, also alluding to inside information, was as improper as the interference play on the national front seeking to overturn Georgia's election.

In Red Wing, I hear cries of "witch hunt," and "we have only begun to fight" and ugly statements about council members — irresponsible speech in light of our political climate ("credible threat" lockdown of Goodhue County building for refugee resettlement vote last year; Sen. Mike Goggin joining Rep. Steve Drazkowski and others, asking Texas A.G. to add Minnesota to lawsuit and disenfranchise Minnesota voters; Jan. 6 D.C. failed insurrection.). There's talk of a recall effort of six council members. These words and actions will not change the Pohlman decision.

Your column (RE, March 6, 2021) hearkens back to a recent failure to accept election results, and uses the rhetorical gambit of using words of others, words conveying little understanding of the process, i.e., process is confidential, Pohlman was represented by counsel, that it was a lengthy process with iterative opportunities for change.

Not one of the supporters' comments you quoted substantively challenged the examples cited in the council's Feb. 19 letter, nor do you make any substantive challenges of your own.

"Remember, if it's important to you, it's important to me."

The flurry of inflammatory charges during confidential proceedings prior to his termination was important enough, concerning enough, that I wrote three missives. And now? It's important to me that decisions of the council be acknowledged, and not undermined. A 6-1 vote is not a close call. That is an "overwhelming majority."

Red Wing has a weak mayor system, with the position being that of a bully pulpit. Using your position for a column of this fomenting tenor is divisive and increases rancor in our community.

In short, based on the information stated in the 2/19 letter, what's been reported in the papers including your words, and a viewing of the short 2/19 council meeting, I support the City Council in its 6-1 decision to terminate Pohlman.



Way back in September, 2021, this came up as a Charter Commission issue, whether to amend the Charter to be in line with City policies, and whether to address some black holes in the Charter. Most of the issues were not a Charter issue, and were instead a matter for the Council in its annual Resolution for Rules of Order and Procedures.

On the agenda for last Monday's meeting, this time around it's Resolution No. 7799, which was linked at the very end of the agenda, and will be up for discussion and a vote on January 3, 2023. Only the Council rules and procedures were linked, and there is annual consideration and adoption of policies for Committees and also for Boards and Commissions.

MOST IMPORTANT SUGGESTION: VIRTUAL MEETING LINK ON FRONT PAGE OF CITY WEBSITE, ADJACENT TO THE CHANNEL 6 LINK, AND VIRTUAL MEETING LINK ON EVERY AGENDA AND MEETING NOTICE.

Attached are my suggestions, all aimed at getting to "Better Public Meetings" for Red Wing:

- Overland suggestions in Track Changes pps. 3-11
- Citizens Assembly "Better Meetings" from final report pps. 12-14
- Resolution 7590 Charter Commission mtg September 9, 2021 pps. 15-22 Overland suggestions at that time in TrackChanges
- Suggestions re: Policy for Boards & Commissions pps. 23-25
- Suggestions re: Policy for Committee Meetings pps. 26-27

The objective is to provide better, more visible and timely notice; make it easy to check in via the internet through links to information, the webcast and virtual meetings; increase ability for folks to track what "our government" is up to; increase "transparency" (oh, I detest that buzzword, but it fits); and make information accessible. promote, encourage, public participation. I'm offering specific suggestions, not just hollering! These suggestions cost little to implement, and will not only help us participate, but will help residents know and understand the thought behind your actions and increase acceptance and confidence in our local government.

RESOLUTION NO. 7799

A Resolution Adopting Rules of Order and Procedures for the City Council in Accordance with the City Charter, Section 5.04

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Red Wing, Minnesota, as follows:

In accordance with the Charter of the City of Red Wing, Section 5.04, the following are hereby adopted as the 2022 rules of order and procedures for the City Council:

 On the first Tuesday after the first Monday of January following a City General Election, the City Council shall hold an organizational meeting to swear in newly-elected officials, and elect officers, adopt the rules of order, adopt the designation of depositories for City funds, adopt the designation of the official newspaper, and conduct any other business as deemed appropriate.

The City Council shall elect officers, adopt the rules of order, adopt the designation of depositories for City funds, and adopt the designation of the official newspaper at the first regular City Council meeting on election years.

- 2. The Council shall elect a Council President, Council Vice President, and Council President Pro Tern. Each officer will serve a one-year term. There will be a term limit for the office of Council President of four consecutive years. The Council President serves as the leader of the Council by running all Council meetings, making appointments of Council liaisons to boards, commissions, and other miscellaneous roles. This supersedes Resolution No. 7590.
- 3. The rules of parliamentary procedure comprised in Robert's Rules of Order, newest revision, shall govern the Council in all cases in which they are applicable, and to the extent they are not inconsistent with these rules, the Charter, Ordinances of the City, or laws of the State of Minnesota. The City Attorney or his/her designee shall function as Parliamentarian to advise the presiding officer on matters of Parliamentary Law.
- 4. The Council shall meet in regular session on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. unless the Council shall direct otherwise. The Council shall meet in special session upon the call of the Mayor, Council President, or three Council Members. When establishing a Special Meeting date, Council members will be informed of the subject and asked whether Public Comment should be added to the agenda, and the Public Notice shall reflect the majority opinion. All meetings shall be held in City Hall unless otherwise directed and properly noticed. All meetings in which action is taken shall be televised or the audio recorded. The Council Administrator shall notify the press and post public notice of the time and purpose of the meeting. Notice of meetings and the manner in which they are conducted shall comply with requirements of the City Charter, City Code, and Minnesota Open Meeting Law. Notice of the meetings shall be posted on the front page of the City website, and a link for virtual participation shall be posted prominently near the front page Channel 6 link and in emailed meeting notices.

5. All reports, visitations, communications, ordinances, resolutions, or other matters to come before the Council shall be reported to the Council Administrator at least by noon of the Thursday prior to each regular meeting. The Council Administrator shall include all appropriate items on the agenda according to the order of business.

Unless the Council otherwise directs, at least 72 hours prior to the meeting (this is too short a time frame to digest and prepare) the Council Administrator shall furnish a copy of the regular meeting agenda and all supporting materials to each Council Member. The Council Administrator shall also furnish the meeting agenda and appropriate supporting materials to the press and City staff. Failure to accomplish any of these tasks shall not invalidate the meeting.

The Council Administrator shall maintain a copy of agenda supporting materials and make the same available <u>online and hard copy</u> for public inspection. All items required to be posted for public notice shall be so done on a notice board located in City Hall <u>and on the City's website</u>.

- a. In the case of routine claims that allow for early payment discounts, travel advances and reimbursements, and payroll-related claims, the Council Administrator, Administrative Business Director, and Mayor are authorized to pay such claims as they become due and without specific approval of the Council, provided they are contained in the next regular listing of all claims.
- b. The Council Administrator shall be authorized to make payments for goods and services delivered or performed as per contract conditions prior to Council meetings at his/her discretion and upon approval, as appropriate, by the various affected department heads. All such payments shall be listed at the next regular Council meeting with the listing of bills.
- c. Public Comment and active involvement of citizens in government is encouraged, through direct contact with City Council, Boards and Commissions, staff, by in person communications, phone, email, and virtual meetings.
- d. . The City Council will dedicate time during each regular meeting to hear from citizens on matters that are on the agenda and matters that are on the consent agenda or not on the agenda. The Council rules for public comment during special meetings and workshops are described in sections 4 and 25.
- e. Public comments are welcomed prior to the meeting, preferably by email to City of Red Wing City Council Mayor citycouncilmayor@ci.red-wing.mn.us to encourage consideration of comments prior to the meeting. Members of the public are also encouraged to contact Council members directly about specific concerns. Comments by email are preferred to allow time to be reviewed and considered when convenient.

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- **e.f.** Public participation is welcomed and encouraged, in person and through use of virtual meetings.
- d.g. The order of business for all regular Council meetings shall be as follows, unless the Council directs otherwise:
 - 1. Call to Order
 - 2. Pledge of Allegiance
 - 3. Statement of Intent
 - 4. Excusal of Members
 - 5. Approval of Agenda
 - 6. Proclamations and Recognitions
 - 7. Public Comment and Presentations
 - 8. Board and Commission Communication
 - 9. Consent Agenda
 - 10. Motions and General Business
 - 11. Council Concerns
 - 12. Council Administrator's Status Report
 - 11.Communication Items incorporating Council Concerns and Admin Report
 - 43.12. Adjournment

Council President, in consultation with the Mayor, Council Vice President, and City Council Administrator shall establish the City Council Agenda for regular and special meetings at the Council Agenda Committee meeting, held on Mondays at 5 p.m. the week before Council meetings. The Council Agenda Committee are public meetings and will be noticed as an open meeting, and notice posted at City Hall, online, and published in the newspaper.

Items that the Council Agenda Committee believes to be of a non-controversial matter shall be placed on the Consent Agenda. Any member of the Council may pull an item from the Consent Agenda and the Council shall then consider that item in its proper order of business.

The presiding officer may vary the order of business or business items to facilitate special orders or the efficient use of meeting time, but not to move agenda items up to circumvent public comment. The Council shall not amend the agenda once the agenda is approved.

Public hearings, bid openings, or other matters with a designated time shall be Special Orders. Any business under consideration at the time noted for a Special Order (other than a Special Order already under consideration) shall be laid on the table for the duration of the Special Order and the Special Order brought up for immediate consideration

Following a closed session, the City Council shall publicly pass a motion to go into open session. By statute, a meeting may be closed for personnel matters, attorney-client

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privilege, labor negotiations, security issues, property sales and purchases (see statutes for specifics).

- 6. The President, or, in his/her absence, the Vice President, or, in both their absences, the President Pro Tern, shall take the chair at the hour appointed for the Council to meet and shall immediately call the members to order. The names of those present, absent, and excused shall be recorded as well as arrival and departure time for the members arriving late or leaving early.
- 7. The presiding officer may debate from the chair and shall not be deprived of any rights or privileges of a Council Member by reason of acting as presiding officer.
- 8. The presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order, subject to appeal to the Council. No person shall be allowed to delay or interrupt the proceedings or refuse to obey the orders and rules of the Council. Every person desiring to speak shall first be recognized by the presiding officer and shall avoid personalities and inappropriate language. Any person can be removed from the meeting for failure to comply with a ruling of the chair or for a violation of these rules. The Police Chief or his designee shall function as Sergeant-at-Arms to assist the presiding officer in enforcing this rule.
 - a. Members of the public and those speaking to the Council shall keep their comments as brief and to the point as possible. No person may speak twice on an item of business until all members of the public have first had the opportunity to speak once.
 - b. The presiding officer may prescribe additional rules of procedure for public hearings so as to preserve decorum and the efficient presentation of citizens' concerns.
 - c. After a mandatory public hearing has been held at the Advisory Planning Commission, individuals will have the opportunity to present comments on the Advisory Planning Commission's recommendations at a City Council meeting. The purpose of allowing comments is to provide the applicant and the public the opportunity to directly address the Council on the matter. The comment period cannot is not to be used for the presentation of new information as all relevant information needs to be provided to the Advisory Planning Commission at the public hearing. If new information is presented to the City Council that was not considered at the public hearing of the Advisory Planning Commission, the Council may vote to send the matter back to the Advisory Planning Commission. All comments will be kept to the customary three-minute limit.

9. In keeping with the intent of the Minnesota Open Meeting Law, the Mayor and City Council members shall not use any form of electronic communication technology, such as text messaging or e-mail, to communicate with one another during public meetings. Nor will elected leaders correspond with third parties during a public meeting on matters

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on the agenda or of public interest or any matter other than a bona fide emergency. Council members who receive electronic communication regarding such, shall disclose the information shared with the public at the meeting. Text or email communications with staff during the meeting is prohibited, and is only permitted in order to address technology or meeting process items. and notice should be made of such technology or meeting process issues.

- 10. A quorum shall consist of at least a majority of all members of the Council, although a majority of any members present may send for and require the attendance of those absent unless excused (how does that work?), or adjourn or recess to any time previous to the next regular session. No member or officer shall absent himself/herself from any session unless excused by the Council.
- 11. When a question is put forward, each Council Member present shall vote aye, nay, or present unless, prior to voting, a Council Member, for special reasons (e.g., conflict of interest) that must be recorded in the minutes, is excused from voting. When a Council Member votes "present", the member is presumed to be abstaining and the vote will be recorded as such. A "present" vote will not be counted when determining a majority vote. Conflict of interest is defined as (see Code of Conduct?)
- 12. Except in an emergency or other unusual circumstance where immediate action is in the best interests of the City, the Council shall not take action on a request for funding that has not been included in the published agenda. The funding request shall be placed on a subsequent agenda for Council consideration.
- 13. The Mayor, Council Members, and staff shall occupy their respective seats in the Chambers while the Council is in session. The Council President on or before the first regular meeting of the year shall make all seating assignments.
- 14. The Council President shall open each agenda item with a brief summary of the issue. A presentation by the appropriate source may be made if requested by the President and/or members of the body or if pre-arranged by issue proponent or member of the public. The Council may discuss or debate the issue prior to the motion being made. Once a motion is made, a second is necessary prior to additional discussion. The President will ask for action once the discussion is over or if a Council member calls the question. If a Council Member calls the question, a vote will occur on that question. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of support will end the debate discussion.
 - a. The presiding officer may recess the Council without a motion at any time he/she deems appropriate and shall state the length of time and the reason for the action.
- 15. If any question contains two or more divisional propositions, the presiding officer may, and upon the request of a member, shall divide the same.
- 16. The vote on all ordinances or resolutions shall be by roll call vote. The vote on all other matters shall be by acclamation. Upon the demand of any member, before the negative has been put (awkard wording), a roll call vote shall be taken on any matter before the

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Council. If after a vote by acclamation it appears that the vote was not unanimous, a division of the house shall immediately be taken, and the individual votes of each member recorded.

- 17. After the decision on any question, any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider any action at the same or the next succeeding meeting provided, however, that a resolution authorizing or relating to any contract may only be reconsidered before the final execution thereof. When notice of intention to move reconsideration shall be given by a member (a motion to reconsider and enter on the minutes), no action shall be taken to bind or commit the City until the next meeting, provided that four members may vote to declare an urgency, in which case the matter shall not be delayed unless then and there reconsidered.
- 18. The City Council shall take action by Resolution if required by law, agencies of the state, and/or City Charter. Generally speaking, the City Council shall take action in the form of a simple motion if a Resolution is not required.
- 19. All proposed ordinances shall be introduced in written form and need not be read. Resolutions introduced in written form need not be read. Any resolution not introduced in writing shall immediately be reduced to writing and a copy furnished to each member of the Council unless waived by unanimous consent.
 - a. After introduction, any proposed ordinance or resolution may be referred by the presiding officer without objection to any regular or special committee of the Council or, when appropriate, a City board or commission.
 - b. Amendments may be adopted at any time and shall be in writing except for minor amendments which may be made orally and duly noted by the City Clerk. The text of amendments need not will be recorded in the minutes but, if not recorded, and shall be preserved along with the original proposed ordinance or resolution as introduced.
- 20. It shall be the responsibility of the Council Administrator, with the assistance of the City Attorney, to review all proposed ordinances and resolutions to assure that each is properly drafted. Each proposed ordinance and resolution shall have a title clearly stating its subject and purpose. When a proposed ordinance amends or repeals existing ordinances, the title shall refer to the section, subdivision, paragraph, subparagraph, and clause affected. Proposed ordinances shall contain the full text of the section, subdivision, paragraph, subparagraph, or clause as amended.

If a proposed ordinance provides for a new section to the City Code and is not an amendment of existing portions of the City Code, the sections, subdivisions, paragraphs, etc. shall be arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as the existing City Code, provided that proposed ordinances which relate only to a single purpose, act, or event (such as franchises or annexations), shall remain uncoded and noted in Chapter 25 of the City Code.

At any time before or after adoption, the Council Administrator is authorized to correct obvious mistakes in spelling, grammar, punctuation, and typographical errors. In addition, the Council Administrator may change obvious mistakes in the codification of any ordinance at any time prior to publication so as to provide that all ordinances are arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as the existing City Code. All corrections shall be put on Consent Agenda.

After the adoption of any ordinances or resolutions, the City Clerk shall cause the engrossment into it of any amendments properly adopted prior to adopting and prepare an accurate enrolled copy for signatures by the presiding officer of the Council and the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall thereafter cause the enrolled copy to be presented to the Mayor as required by the Charter. Ordinances shall be kept in a permanent file in numerical order as adopted with proof of publication attached. Resolutions shall likewise be numbered and maintained within a separate book.

An enrolled ordinance shall be labeled "Ordinance No. Fourth Series". An enrolled resolution shall be labeled "Resolution No._". In all other respects, the ordinance or resolution shall be identical to the proposed ordinance or resolution as adopted by the Council subject to the correction of obvious mistakes as provided for in this rule.

21. In accordance with Charter provisions, the Mayor has the right to veto any ordinance or resolution. Except for emergency ordinances, the veto must occur within 96 hours, not including Saturdays, Sundays, or holidays, of receipt of the ordinance or resolution and shall be returned to the City Clerk with a written objection message. The Council shall be

presented with the ordinance or resolution and the written veto objection at the next regular Council meeting or at a special meeting called by the Mayor, the President of the Council, or any three members of the Council. When the vote is taken on the veto override, it shall be by roll call and the question shall be "Shall the veto be overruled and the ordinance/resolution repassed?" If the ordinance or resolution receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members, it shall be deemed adopted without the Mayor's approval and, in the case of ordinances, published as other ordinances.

- 22. Subject to the City Council's approval, City boards and commissions may adopt their own rules of procedure adopted annually for use at their regular meetings. In the event boards or commissions have not adopted rules of procedure, they will follow the City Council rules (3.c. above???), insofar as practical. The establishment of rules of procedure is not intended to curtail the authority of any board or commission in the programming of any operation; rules of procedure are intended to create a foundation under which a public board will conduct business.
- 23. Board and commission staff liaisons shall cause minutes of the meetings to be kept and in all cases minutes, including those of related City entities, shall be promptly filed with the City Clerk. Minutes shall provide a general background on the topic; a summary of the discussion, specific action being considered and the tally of the vote, and shall be posted on the board or commission's webpage.

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The Council Administrator shall ensure the meetings are appropriately staffed. The Council Administrator's ex-officio, non-voting membership on all boards and commissions shall not count for purposes of determining a quorum, majority, or exceptional majority vote requirements. Quorums shall be a majority of the appointed commission or board members.

24. The City Council may meet in a workshop session as an alternative to a regular or special meeting when no action is requested. Generally, the subject of the workshop is on one topic, or a joint meeting with another public entity, or, in some cases a forum for exchange of ideas. In all cases, topics discussed at workshops will advance to a formal City Council meeting if action is being considered. The workshop format is generally more informal. Workshops can be held at alternative sites. In all cases, workshops, including mobile workshops like the city tour, shall be audio or video recorded and webcast where feasible. Workshops require public notice and are open to the public.

When setting the date for the workshop, Council members will be asked whether public comments shall be included on the agenda. The Public meeting notice will include information about the topic of the workshop and on whether how public comments will be taken at the meeting. All comments must be pertinent to the workshop topic and will be taken at the end of the workshop. Citizens are encouraged to bring any public comments about workshops to a future City Council meeting regardless of whether public comment is taken at the workshop.

Members of the public are encouraged to submit comments on workshop issues and materials via email to citycouncilmayor@ci.red-wing.mn.us prior to the meeting to allow for consideration before and incorporation into workshop. This statement shall be included in all workshop notices.

- 25. The Council may have Ad Hoc subcommittees to research and explore solutions to problems and/or brainstorm on projects. Notice of establishment, purpose, members, and meeting times shall be provided on the City website. The Ad Hoc subcommittees must be smaller than a quorum of the Council, have a limited scope of study, and have no decision-making authority. Meetings do not need to will be publicly noticed, nor willand agendas and informal minutes be necessaryshall be taken and filed. Summaries and recommendations of Ad Hoc subcommittee work will be reported to the full City Council in the Status Report on a regular basis.
- 26. The Council may establish Standing Committees to process work. Standing Committees have regular scheduled meetings, limited scope of responsibilities, and limited authority. Agendas, membership, and minutes will be provided for standing Committees with the exception of the Agenda Committee. Public Comment will be at the discretion of the Committee chair and included on the agenda, if directed by the chair. memorities issues and materials via email to citycouncilmayor@ci.red-wing.mn.us prior to the meeting to allow for consideration before and incorporation into work of the committee.

27.	The City Council will receive a copy of the List of Standing and Ad Hoc Committees in January of each year. The committee list and appointments will be made public on the City's web site.

Public Participation

Better Public Meetings

Summary of Better Public Meetings: Public meetings are a common feature of local government, often required by state and federal law. "Better Public Meetings" refers to the concept of improving face-to-face meetings of community members and public officials to encourage more productive dialogue and decision-making among diverse groups of a community. Better public meetings are intended to reduce feelings of anger or apathy among community members. There are a variety of public meeting formats that move beyond the common townhall-style meeting where individual community members wait to speak for a few minutes at a microphone without engaging in conversation with others. Small group conversation is often a common feature of better public meetings.

We believe pursuing Better Public Meetings might offer these top benefits to the City of Red Wing:

- Allows more community members to feel they are heard and contributing (8)
- Empowers diverse groups of citizens to be active in public decision-making (7)
- Provides information and promotes civil discourse (5)
- Could allow community members to be more comfortable and engage where there are facilitators (5)
- Can help focus on important issues (5)

However, we believe pursuing Better Public Meetings might require addressing these top considerations:

- Training/retaining local facilitators (9)
- How to manage conflict, allow difference of opinion, talk effectively (8)
- Designing agenda and process effectively (7)
- How to decide when, where, how long to hold meeting and communicate info effectively (4)
- Resistance to changing style, being open to input (3)

Red Wing, MN Citizens Assembly

The following bullet points represent the concepts which received the highest number of votes, followed by the number of votes they received in parentheses. The votes were conducted on the overall concepts; while the sub-points were used to inform deliberation, each participant voting on the general concepts did not necessarily approve of each individual sub-point.

If we were to pursue better public meetings in Red Wing, it would be important to:

- o Invest in and recruit trained, local facilitators. (16)
 - We would invest in training community members in facilitating/moderating alternate forms of public meetings in order to develop and support an engaged community.
 - We would have trained facilitators in order to keep focus, set timelines, and mediate to have effective meetings.

RESOLUTION NO. 7590

A Resolution Adopting Rules of Order and Procedures for the City Council in Accordance with the City Charter, Section 5.04

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Red Wing, Minnesota, as follows:

In accordance with the Charter of the City of Red Wing, Section 5.04, the following are hereby adopted as the 2021 rules of order and procedures for the City Council:

- Each year on the first Tuesday following the first Monday of January the City Council
 will hold an organizational meeting to swear in newly-elected officials, if appropriate,
 and elect officers, adopt the rules of order, adopt the designation of depositories for
 City funds, adopt the designation of the official newspaper, and conduct any other
 business as deemed appropriate.
- The Council shall elect a Council President, Council Vice President, and Council President Pro Tern. Each officer will serve a one year term. There will be a term limit for the office of Council President of four consecutive years. The Council President serves as the leader of the Council by running all Council meetings, making appointments of Council liaisons to boards, commissions, and other miscellaneous roles. This supersedes Resolution No. 5925.
- 3. The rules of parliamentary procedure comprised in Robert's Rules of Order, newest revision, shall govern the Council in all cases in which they are applicable, and to the extent they are not inconsistent with these rules, the Charter, Ordinances of the City, or laws of the State of Minnesota. The City Attorney or his/her designee shall function as Parliamentarian to advise the presiding officer on matters of Parliamentary Law.
- 4. The Council shall meet in regular session on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. unless the Council shall direct otherwise. The Council shall meet in special session upon the call of the Mayor, Council President, or three Council Members. All meetings shall be held in City Hall unless otherwise directed and properly noticed. All meetings in which action is taken shall be televised or digitally recorded and full recording shall be archived on city website.
 - a. Notice of call and business to be conducted for a special meeting of the Council shall be delivered to the Council Administrator by the person calling said meeting. The Council Administrator shall immediately notify the remaining members and the press, and post public notice of the time and purpose of the meeting. Notice of meetings and the manner in which they are conducted shall comply with requirements of the City Charter, City Code, and Minnesota Open Meeting Law.

- All reports, visitations, communications, ordinances, resolutions or other matters to come before the Council shall be reported to the Council Administrator at least by noon of the <u>WednTu</u>esday prior to each regular meeting. The Council Administrator shall include all appropriate items on the agenda according to the order of business.
 - Unless the Council otherwise directs, at least 72120 hours prior to the meeting the Council Administrator shall furnish a copy of the regular meeting agenda and all supporting materials to each Council Member. The Council Administrator shall also furnish the meeting agenda and appropriate supporting materials to the press, and City staff and publish on city website and distribute to distribution list. Failure to accomplish any of these tasks shall not invalidate the meeting. The Council Administrator shall maintain a copy of agenda supporting materials and make sufficient copies the same available for public inspection and meeting attendees. All items required to be posted for public notice shall be so done on a notice board located in City Hall and city website.
 - a. In the case of routine claims that allow for early payment discounts, travel advances and reimbursements, and payroll-related claims, the Council Administrator, Administrative Business Director, and Mayor are authorized to pay such claims as they become due and without specific approval of the Council, provided they are contained in the next regular listing of all claims.
 - b. The Council Administrator shall be authorized to make payments for goods and services delivered or performed as per contract conditions prior to Council meetings at his/her discretion and upon approval, as appropriate, by the various affected department heads. All such payments shall be listed at the next regular Council meeting with the listing of bills.
 - c. The order of business for all regular Council meetings shall be as follows, unless the Council directs otherwise:

 - 11. Council Concerns
 - Council Administrator's Status Report
 - 13. Adjournment

Except in an emergency or other unusual circumstance where immediate action is in the best interests of the City, the Council shall not take action on a request for funding that has not been included in the published agenda. The funding request shall be placed on a subsequent agenda for Council consideration.
- 13. The Mayor, Council Members, and staff shall occupy their respective seats in the Chambers while the Council is in session. The Council President on or before the first regular meeting of the year shall make all seating assignments.

- 14. The Council President shall open each agenda item with a brief summary of the issue. A reasonable amount of time shall be provided for a presentation by the party raising the issue, and a presentation from another appropriate source may be made if requested by the President and/or members of the body. The Council may discuss or debate the issue prior to the motion being made. Once a motion is made, a second is necessary prior to additional discussion. The President will ask for action once the discussion is over or if a Council member calls the question. If a Council Member calls the question, a vote will occur on that question. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of support will end the debate.
 - a. The presiding officer may recess the Council without a motion at any time he/she deems appropriate and shall state the length of time and the reason for the action.
- 15. If any question contains two or more divisional propositions, the presiding officer may, and <u>shall</u> upon the request of a member₁-shall divide the same.
- 16. The vote on all ordinances or resolutions shall be by roll call vote. The vote on all other matters shall be by acclamation. Upon the demand of any member, before the negative has been put, a roll call vote shall be taken on any matter before the Council. If after a vote by acclamation it appears that the vote was not unanimous, a division of the house shall immediately be taken and the individual votes of each member recorded.
- 17. After the decision on any question, any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider any action at the same or the next succeeding meeting provided, however, that a resolution authorizing or relating to any contract may only be reconsidered before the final execution thereof. When notice of intention to move reconsideration shall be given by a member (a motion to reconsider and enter on the minutes), no action shall be taken to bind or commit the City until the next meeting, provided that four members may vote to declare an urgency, in which case the matter shall not be delayed unless then and there reconsidered.
- 18. The City Council shall take action by Resolution if required by law, agencies of the state, and/or City Charter. Generally speaking, the City Council shall take action in the form of a simple motion if a Resolution is not required.
- 19. All proposed ordinances shall be introduced in written form and need not be read. Resolutions introduced in written form need not be read. Any resolution not introduced in writing shall immediately be reduced to writing and a copy furnished to each member of the Council unless waived by unanimous consent. <u>Resolutions and ordinances shall be included with the agenda.</u>
 - a. After introduction, any proposed ordinance or resolution may be referred by the presiding officer without objection to any regular or special committee of the Council or, when appropriate, a City board or commission.

- b. Amendments may be adopted at any time and shall be in writing except for minor amendments which may be made orally and duly noted by the City Clerk. The text of amendments need not shall be recorded in the minutes, but, if not recorded, and shall be preserved along with the original proposed ordinance or resolution as introduced.
- 20. It shall be the responsibility of the Council Administrator, with the assistance of the City Attorney, to review all proposed ordinances and resolutions to assure that each is properly drafted. Each proposed ordinance and resolution shall have a title clearly stating its subject and purpose. When a proposed ordinance amends or repeals existing ordinances, the title shall refer to the section, subdivision, paragraph, subparagraph, and clause affected. Proposed ordinances shall contain the full text of the section, subdivision, paragraph, subparagraph, or clause as amended. Proposed ordinances and resolutions shall be included as a part of the agenda.

If a proposed ordinance provides for a new section to the City Code and is not an amendment of existing portions of the City Code, the sections, subdivisions, paragraphs, etc. shall be arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as the existing City Code, provided that proposed ordinances which relate only to a single purpose, act, or event (such as franchises or annexations), shall remain uncoded and noted in Chapter 25 of the City Code.

At any time before or after adoption, the Council Administrator is authorized to correct obvious mistakes in spelling, grammar, punctuation, and typographical errors. In addition, the Council Administrator may change obvious mistakes in the codification of any ordinance at any time prior to publication so as to provide that all ordinances are arranged, subdivided, and numbered in like manner as the existing City Code.

After the adoption of any ordinances or resolutions, the City Clerk shall cause the engrossment into it of any amendments properly adopted prior to adopting and prepare an accurate enrolled copy for signatures by the presiding officer of the Council and the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall thereafter cause the enrolled copy to be presented to the Mayor as required by the Charter. Ordinances shall be kept in a permanent file in numerical order as adopted with proof of publication attached. Resolutions shall likewise be numbered and maintained within a separate book.

An enrolled ordinance shall be labeled "Ordinance No. Fourth Series". An enrolled resolution shall be labeled "Resolution No._". In all other respects, the ordinance or resolution shall be identical to the proposed ordinance or resolution as adopted by the Council subject to the correction of obvious mistakes as provided for in this rule.

- 21. In accordance with Charter provisions, the Mayor has the right to veto any ordinance or resolution. Except for emergency ordinances, the veto must occur within 96 hours, not including Saturdays, Sundays, or holidays, of receipt of the ordinance or resolution and shall be returned to the City Clerk with a written objection message. The Council shall be presented with the ordinance or resolution and the written veto objection at the next regular Council meeting or at a special meeting called by the Mayor, the President of the Council, or any three members of the Council. When the vote is taken on the veto override, it shall be by roll call and the question shall be "Shall the veto be overruled and the ordinance/resolution repassed?" If the ordinance or resolution receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members, it shall be deemed adopted without the Mayor's approval and, in the case of ordinances, published as other ordinances.
- 22. Subject to the City Council's approval, City boards and commissions may adopt their own rules of procedure adopted annually for use at their regular meetings. In the event boards or commissions have not adopted rules of procedure, they will follow the City Council rules (3.c. above), insofar as practical. The establishment of rules of procedure is not intended to curtail the authority of any board or commission in the programming of any operation; rules of procedure are intended to create a foundation under which a public board will conduct business. The Notice and Public Comment provisions above shall apply to all City boards and commissions, committees, and ad hoc committees.
- 23. Board and commission staff liaisons shall cause minutes of the meetings to be kept and in all cases minutes, including those of related City entities, shall be promptly filed with the City Clerk and posted on the city website. Minutes shall provide a general background on the topic; a summary of the discussion, specific action being considered and the tally of the vote. The Council Administrator shall ensure the meetings are appropriately staffed. The Council Administrator's ex-officio, non-voting membership on all boards and commissions shall not count for purposes of determining a quorum, majority, or exceptional majority vote requirements. Quorums shall be a majority of the appointed commission or board members.
- 24. The City Council may meet in a workshop session as an alternative to a regular or special meeting when no action is requested. Generally, the subject of the workshop is a more focused discussion on one topic, where the format is a general discussion, as compared to a formal meeting. Workshops can be held at alternative work sites. In all cases, workshops, even mobile workshops like the spring tour, shall be audio recorded. Workshops require public notice, and are open to the public, and must have a public comment period at the beginning of meeting for comments pertinent to the subject of the workshop session.
- 25. The Council may have Ad Hoc subcommittees to research and explore solutions to problems and/or brainstorm on projects. The Ad Hoc subcommittees must be smaller than a quorum of the Council, and meetings do not need tomust be publicly

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Noticed <u>and posted on the city website</u>. Summaries and recommendations of Ad Hoc subcommittee work will be reported to the full City Council <u>and posted on the city website</u>.

26. These rules may be suspended or amended by a majority vote of all elected members, provided that any amendments shall be presented in writing at the preceding regular meeting and placed on the subsequent agenda under the order of Motions and General Business.

Rules of Order and Procedures for Boards and Commissions in Accordance with the City Charter, Section 5.04

In accordance with the Charter of the City of Red Wing, Section 5.04, the following are hereby adopted (pursuant to Resolution No. 7590 adopted by the Red Wing City Council on January 6, 2021) as the 2021 rules of order and procedures for Boards and Commissions:

- 1. The rules of parliamentary procedure comprised in Robert Rules of Order, newest revision, shall govern Boards and Commissions in all cases in which they are applicable, and to the extent they are not inconsistent with these rules, the Charter, Ordinances of the City, or laws of the State of Minnesota. The staff liaison or his/her designee shall function as Parliamentarian to advise the presiding officer on matters of Parliamentary Law.
- Boards/Commissions shall meet in regular session in the City Council Chambers at City Hall.
- 3. All reports, visitations, communications, resolutions or other matters to come before the Boards and Commissions shall be reported to the staff liaison at least by noon of the WednTuesday prior to each regular meeting. The staff liaison shall include all appropriate items on the agenda according to the order of business.

Unless Boards and Commissions otherwise direct, at least 12072 hours prior to the meeting the staff liaison shall furnish a copy of the regular meeting agenda and all supporting materials to each Board/Commission member, either electronically or in paper form and post to the City's website. The staff liaison shall also furnish the meeting agenda and appropriate sufficient supporting materials to the press and City Council and public. Failure to accomplish any of these tasks shall not invalidate the meeting.

The staff liaison shall maintain a copy of agenda supporting materials, make the same available for public inspection and provide a copy to the Clerk Receptionist, who will make the materials available on the City's web site. All items required to be posted for public notice shall be so done on a notice board located in City Hall and the City's website.

- A. The staff liaison shall be authorized to make payments for goods and services delivered or performed as per contract conditions prior to Board/Commission meetings at his/her discretion and upon approval, as appropriate, by the various affected department heads. A regular report on fiscal status, if appropriate, will be made to the Board/Commission.
- B. The order of business for all regular Board/Commission meetings shall include:

A Call To Order
Roll Call
Approval of Agenda
Approval of Minutes of Preceding Meetings
Public Comment and Presentations
Motions and General Business
Adjournment.

- C. Board and Commissions are <u>encouraged</u>, <u>but not mandated</u>, to include the Pledge of Allegiance, <u>public comment</u> and Board/Commission Comments (previously called Concerns) on their business agenda.
- D. Boards and Commissions are <u>encouraged</u>, <u>but not mandated</u>, to include the Statement of Intent and the Board/Commission's mission statement as either a written part of the agenda document or as a statement read by the Board Chair, or as a Statement read by the entire Commission attendees.
- E. The Presiding Officer may vary the order of business or business items to facilitate special orders or the efficient use of meeting time, <u>but not so as to circumvent or</u> <u>delay public participation</u>.
- 4. The Chairperson, or in his/her absence, the Vice Chairperson, or in both their absences, the member present with the most tenure in office, shall take the chair at the hour appointed for the Board/Commission to meet and shall immediately call the members to order. The names of those present, absent, and excused shall be recorded as well as arrival and departure time for the members arriving late or leaving early.
- The presiding officer may debate from the chair and shall not be deprived of any rights or privileges of a Board/Commission member by reason of acting as presiding officer.
- 6. The presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order. No person shall be allowed to delay or interrupt the proceedings or refuse to obey the orders and rules of the Board/Commission. General public comment shall be on the agenda of every public meeting, and comments specific to an agenda item shall be allowed prior to consideration of that agenda item. A party raising an issue that has been placed on the agenda shall have an opportunity to make a presentation regarding that item.
- A quorum shall consist of at least a majority of all members of the Board/Commission. If there is not a quorum no official action can be conducted. The meeting can be held for discussion purposes only. A simple majority is necessary for approval of regular business items.
- 8. When a question is put forward, each Board/Commission member present shall vote aye, nay, or present, unless prior to voting a Board/Commission member, for special reasons (e.g. conflict of interest), which must be recorded in the minutes as "recused, and is excused from voting. When a Board/Commission member votes "present", the member is presumed to be abstaining and the vote will be recorded as such. A "present" vote will not be counted when determining a majority vote.
- 9. The Board/Commission Chair shall open each agenda item with a brief summary of the issue. A <u>reasonable amount of time shall be provided for a presentation by the party raising the issue, and a presentation from another appropriate source, such as the staff liaison, may be made if requested by the chair and or members of the body. Board/Commissioners may discuss or debate the issue prior to a motion being made. Once a motion is made, a second is necessary prior to additional discussion. The Chair will ask for action once discussion is over or if a board/commissioner calls the question. If a Board/Commission member calls the question, a vote will occur on that question. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of</u>

support will end the debate.

- A. The presiding officer may recess the Board/Commission without a motion at any time he/she deems appropriate and shall state the length of time and the reason for the action.
- 1O.After the decision on any question, any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider any action at the same or the next succeeding meeting provided, however, that a resolution authorizing or relating to any contract may only be reconsidered before the final execution thereof. When notice of intention to move reconsideration shall be given by a member (a motion to reconsider and enter on the minutes), no action shall be taken to bind or commit the Board/Commission until the next meeting, provided that five members may vote to declare an urgency, in which case the matter shall not be delayed unless then and there reconsidered.
- 11. Board or Commissions shall take action by Resolution if required by law, agencies of the state and/or organizational by-laws. Generally speaking, boards and commissions shall take action in the form of a simple motion if a Resolution is not required. The Board or Commission chair may direct that a roll call vote be taken on any vote taken by the board or commission.
- 12. Board and commission staff liaisons shall cause minutes of the meetings to be kept and posted on the City's website. Board and Commission minutes shall provide a general background on the topic, a summary of the discussion, specific action being considered and the tally of the vote. Resolutions shall be included with the agenda and the minutes. In all cases minutes, including those of related City entities, shall be promptly filed with the City Clerk. The Council Administrator's ex-officio, non-voting membership on all boards and commissions shall not count for purposes of determining a quorum, majority, or exceptional majority vote requirements. Quorums shall be a majority of the appointed commission or board members.
- 13. Boards/Commission may meet in Workshop session as an alternate to a regular or special meeting when no action is requested. Generally, the subject of a workshop is a more focused discussion on one topic, where the format is a general discussion, as compared to a formal meeting. Workshops can be held at alternate work sites. In all cases, workshops, even mobile workshops like the spring tour, shall be audio recorded. Workshop require public notice, and are open to the public, and shall have a public comment period at the beginning of meeting for comments pertinent to the subject of the workshop session.
- 14. Board/Commission may have Ad Hoc subcommittees to research and explore solutions to problems and/or brainstorm on projects. The Ad Hoc subcommittees must be smaller than a quorum of the board/commission, name of committee and members posted on City's website, and meetings do not need toshall be publically noticed and published on the City's website. It is not necessary for the staff liaison to attend all Ad Hoc Committee meetings, nor do they need to be recorded. All Ad Hoc Subcommittee work will be reported to the full Board/Commission and recorded in the minutes.

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City of Red Wing Policy for Committee Meetings

General Statement of Purpose: It is the intention of the City of Red Wing that the operations of city government be as open and transparent as possible. In order to avoid confusion and to provide general guidelines for how committee meetings should be held, the following shall be the policy of the City of Red Wing for conducting committee meetings as described below:

1) Standing Committees: Standing committees are defined as committees which meet on a regular, on-going basis, with a defined set of ongoing tasks. With the exception of the Personnel Committee, the power of a standing committee is advisory only and is limited to making a recommendation to the City Council. The standing committee may hear information that is not presented to the City Council in making its recommendation. The City Council retains the right and has the duty to make all final decisions related to such recommendations. The default policy shall be that standing committees meetings shall always be open, and shall be noticed in accordance with the Open Meeting Law and on the city website. Standing committees shall have a public comment period at the start of the meeting.

A list of standing committees, <u>schedule</u>, <u>and members</u> is attached, <u>and shall be posted on</u> the City website's City Council page with "Standing Committee" link for ease of access.

- 2) Ad Hoc Committees: Ad Hoc committees are defined as those committees which are formed for a particular, limited purpose, and which have a defined end point to their duties. The power of an ad hoc committee is advisory only and is limited to making a recommendation to the City Council. The ad hoc committee may hear information that is not presented to the City Council in making its recommendation. The City Council retains the right and has the duty to make all final decisions related to such recommendations. These meetings shall be open. They will not shall be formally noticed, although when possible and information regarding these meetings will be announced at City Council meetings and/or posted on the City website.
- 3) Committee Meeting with Prairie Island Indian Community ("PIIC"): Committee meetings between council members where less than a quorum is present, and members of the PIIC are present, shall be closed, but shall be reported on at the next City Council meeting. The power of a committee assigned to meet with the PIIC is advisory only and is limited to making recommendations to the City Council.
- 4) Agenda Meetings: Meetings for discussion of what is to be included on the City Council agenda shall be open, and notice shall be provided on City website and published in paper at least monthly.
- 5) General Policy Guidelines That Apply to All Meetings:
 - a. <u>Public Participation:</u> When a meeting is open, the public is invited to attend and observe meetings, but not to and participate unless when invited to do so. <u>All public meetings</u>, including committee, agenda, and ad hoc committee meetings

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shall have a public comment period at the beginning of the meeting.

- b. Agendas, Minutes and Other Printed Materials: Standing committees generally have agendas, which will be available outside the committee meeting room prior to the meetings. Ad hoc committees may or may not have agendas prepared. Formal minutes will not be prepared for ad hoc committee meetings. While the OML requires that member votes be kept in a public journal, this provision is not expected to apply because committee members have no decision-making powers and therefore will not be voting or otherwise making decisions. Minn. Stat. 13D.0l, subd. 4(a). When printed materials related to agenda items are to be considered during a meeting, one set of those materials will be available for review. Minn. Stat. § 13D.0l, subd. 6(a).
- c. <u>Meetings by Telephone Conference</u>: Ad hoc committee meetings may be attended by speaker phone or other voice or audio electronic communication. Whenever practical, at least one member of the committee shall be physically in a city building. <u>Access information for phone or webcast shall be disclosed on the agenda, the city website, and published with meeting notice.</u>
- d. Closure of Meetings: With the exception of the Personnel Committee, committee meetings may be closed by the Committee Chairperson for issues such as the discussion of private personnel data or other sensitive topics such as contract negotiations. The Committee Chairperson is chosen by committee member consensus. If a meeting is closed for one of these reasons, a stated reason shall be given and recorded in minutes. Meetings of the Personnel Committee may be closed in accordance with the provisions of the Open Meeting Law that mandate and/or allow certain meetings to be closed.

Dean and all of Council & Mayor:

Dean, you're not off the hook yet! You were Council liaison for the Charter Commission and you were at that 9/9/2021 Charter Commission meeting... the Charter posted on the City's site is as of June 2020, no amendment. Click here to view the Red Wing City Charter.

WAS THIS EVER TAKEN UP BY THE COUNCIL??? Nope -- because there was no opportunity because Klitzke was MIA, and changes to the Charter by the Council would require ALL council members. Now that we have a full complement of members, maybe it's time to start over...

I went through the meetings, starting in September 2021 after the September 9,2021 Charter Commission meeting. The Sept. 27 mtg, it was on agenda, 10B to establish public hearing date, October 25, 2021.

On the September 27th meeting, there was discussion of whether Charter or Policy, leaning on amending Policy, and these were "things we're already doing" and desire to keep it in Policy (Council control), to beef up "Public Comment," and amend Policy to reflect Charter Commission recommendation. There was language regarding Special Meeting in the recommendation. On that meeting, starts at 2:48, and in packet, p. 328-338 of the pdf. Lots of language, but it was only a matter of setting up the requisite public hearing, which was scheduled.

On October 25th, it's item 10A, starts at 1:45, and p. 316-327 of 686 of the pdf. Allende-De Jung was confused, when she's upset and noting that there's nothing about Public Comment at Committee meetings in this, and, well, that's intentional, because this is the Charter section 5, about the City Council, and it's Charter, not "Policy" for Council (and not Committees, or Commissions and Boards). That's a separate step. Alan got to the heart of the matter, we need increased public comment opportunity. There again was lots of language in Council comments, and claimed desire to address this in Policy rather than the charter, but that's just words, because it didn't happen. It was lip service only.

Increasing notice and public comment opportunity before the Council in the Charter (saving Committees and Boards and Commission for policy changes), that was my intent in recommending specifics in the Charter, and because there was resistance, from the Council, with claims that we'd have to revise the Charter, blah, blah, blah, that just doesn't hold for me. Publications of Notices, publication on the City website, that isn't going to change anytime soon, and emergency meetings require only "publication" by posting on City bulletin board. Operating to ENCOURAGE public comment? That should be nailed down in the Charter as a fundamental intent for Council meetings. The resistance to that makes no sense. Objections to "full recording" make no sense given the language immediately before and after, to infer "full recording" would include a closed portion makes no logical or legal sense, but a change to "full recording of <u>public</u> meetings shall" would address that objection. It's easy enough to amend if people are confused on what "full recording" means. Anyway...

Despite the repeated statements that encouraging public participation should be addressed in Council Policy, there have been no material changes to Council policy to recognize the need for and encourage public participation. The only change I see is a correction of the citation to Council rules in para. 22!! "These are in Policy space, and need to be addressed in Policy space." OK, so do it!

Where are Policy amendments for 2022? Didn't happen. So now we're looking at 2023.

Looks like no policy amendments or beefing up is happening via Resolution 7837. Resolution 7837 isn't just for you, it's for residents to know your M.O. and how we fit in.

Particularly important are the policy paragraphs in Resolution 7837 regarding NOTICE:

- Paragraphs 4 notice with link to <u>WEBEX</u>
- Paragraph 5, with each notice requirement, add requirement to post on City Website.
- Paragraph 23.

Encourage **EFFECTIVE** public participation, encouraging people to send in comments to Council PRIOR to the meeting so you have time to digest, i.e. 5c; 5e (with email link, make it easy); addition to para. 24and 26 of encouragement to send comments BEFORE the meeting with the link. There should be a statement about this on the website -- the link is there, but alter website language to ENCOURAGE, that early comments increase chances of impact and effectiveness. If people can be effective, if we're heard, we'll be much less angry!

Clarify public meeting exceptions requiring closed meetings because there's been a LOT of misinformation flying around about this:

• Paragraph 5, last paragraph, just before 6, **ADD DESCRIPTION OF CLOSED MEETING REQUIREMENTS WITH STATUTORY CITATION.**This is important, because it's clear many do NOT understand the statutory requirements to close meetings.

Conflict of interest:

Paragraph 11 should refer to Code of Conduct and summarize definitions of Conflict. Does anyone remember Mayor Egan?!?!

Board and Commission policy:

• Paragraph 23 -- Boards and Commissions should receive affirmative notice that they may encourage and strengthen public participation via their annual approval of policies (which then have to go to the Council for approval).

Overall, what I see is resistance to "encouragement" of public participation. How about getting on this and encouraging the public!!

And will there be public comment on January 3? There should be.

Public Participation

"Public Participation" refers to how citizens impact the quality of government by acting in their community and in conjunction with government.

Better Public Meetings

Summary of Better Public Meetings: Public meetings are a common feature of local government, often required by state and federal law. "Better Public Meetings" refers to the concept of Improving face-to-face meetings of community members and public officials to encourage more productive dialogue and decision-making among diverse groups of a community. Better public meetings are intended to reduce feelings of anger or apathy among community members. There are a variety of public meeting formats that move beyond the common townhall-style meeting where individual community members wait to speak for a few minutes at a microphone without engaging in conversation with others. Small group conversation is often a common feature of better public meetings.

Current Status of Public Meetings in Red Wing: Outside of City Council meetings and committee meetings, public meetings for the City of Red Wing are mostly limited to addressing specific topics—like the future of Mississippi National Golf Links or open houses dedicated to the Highway 63 Red Wing Bridge project. For the 2040 Comprehensive Plan process, the city is testing different ways of conducting in-person meetings like pop-up meetings.

The following bullet points represent the concepts which received the highest number of votes, followed by the number of votes they received in parentheses.

We believe pursuing Better Public Meetings might after these top benefits to the City of Red Wing:

- Allows more community members to feel they are heard and contributing (8)
- Empowers diverse groups of citizens to be active in public decision-making (7)
- Provides information and promotes civil discourse (5)
- Could allow community members to be more comfortable and engage where there
 are facilitators (5)
- Can help focus on important issues (5)

However, we believe pursuing Better Public Meetings might require addressing these top considerations:

- Training/retaining local facilitators (9)
- How to manage conflict, allow difference of opinion, talk effectively (8)
- Designing agenda and process affectively (7)
- How to decide when, where, how long to hold meeting and communicate info effectively (4)
- · Resistance to changing style, being open to input (3)

The following bullet points represent the concepts which received the highest number of votes, followed by the number of votes they received in parentheses. The votes were conducted on the overall concepts; while the sub-points were used to inform deliberation, each participant voting on the general concepts did not necessarily approve of each individual sub-point.

If we were to pursue better public meetings in Red Wing, it would be important to:

- o Invest in and recruit trained, local facilitators. (16)
 - We would invest in training community members in facilitating/moderating alternate forms of public meetings in order to develop and support an engaged community.
 - We would have trained facilitators in order to keep focus, set timelines, and mediate to have effective meetings.
- Develop and distribute pre-meeting educational materials to prepare participants. (14)
 - We would do pre-meeting education on the issues to be presented.
 - We would educate the public about different types of meetings, apcoming agendas in order to increase knowledge and participation.
 - We would define the purpose of the meetings (to inform, consult, involve, collaborate, or empower) in order to be productive, satisfy participants, and achieve desired or intended purpose.
 - We would educate people about how to participate.
 - We would make the meeting agenda available in multiple mediums in order to
 encourage as many people as possible to participate in the process.
- a Conduct targeted outreach to diverse populations. (12)
 - We would implement an outreach program to actively seek engagement from a more diverse group of citizens, including those from multiple ethnic and religious backgrounds, differently abled, the LGBTQ community, and the elderly.
- Vary the time and location of meetings, (12)
 - We would introduce alternative time/place/formats for meetings in order to improve the level of community engagement and commitment.
 - We would do a time schedule to accommodate many, if not all.
- Utilize alternative meeting formats (9)
 - By adopting alternative meeting formats including open space and portable meetings, we would increase public input and engagement.
 - We would increase participation and convenience for the public by offering lown meetings at different times and allowing citizens to participate digitally, in real time, to ensure equity.
- Seek out, learn, and adopt best practices (5)
 - We would seek, learn and follow best practices in order to ensure productive and well received meetings.
- We would have no-pressure, facilitated, personal meetings aimed at a diverse audience and take advantage of existing community groups in order to increase the power of the process and give officials the opportunity to make better decisions. (2)
- Generate buy-in from city personnel. (1)
 - We would goin buy in from city officials and staff that improved dialogue is needed to improve their engagement, participation, and communication.

Agenda Item 10C - Consider Motion to Adopt * Resolution No. 7852 Amending the Rules of Order and Procedures for the City Council in Accordance with the City Charter, Section 5.04.

From the Red Wing Citizens Assembly, a focus was to increase access and public participation, to work for "better meetings." The purpose of the Charter Commission discussion, a year ago, was to do the same, and my proposals were intended to be a starting point for discussion by the Council. There was no discussion, the topic was shut down at that first January meeting, no discussion at all, and pushed off until later.

"Later" is upon us. From the Staff Report:

Council adopted the proposed Resolution No. 7837 on January 3, 2023 as presented by staff, and agreed to consider the proposed changes in the future. The Council asked for and received feedback from the City Attorney regarding the proposed changes from Ms. Overland. In a meeting led by Council president Beise, with input from Council Member Kliewer, Farrar and Mayor Wilson, the Resolution was reviewed. Several changes to Resolution No. 7837 are recommended to the full City Council.

Why was input limited to Beise, Kliewer, Farrar and Wilson? Well, the "why" isn't hard to guess.

Also, I don't see that Community Engagement Specialist, Michelle Leise, was consulted. Earth to Mars, Community Engagement at issue, no input from the Community Engagement Specialist. Again, the "why" isn't hard to guess.

And what was recommended by this stellar group?

<u>Section 5.c. -</u> the language in this section modifies the City Council practice regarding public comment. The proposed language prohibits virtual public comment, and clarifies that the City will take public comment in person and by email. Email comments will not be read aloud, but will be included as part of the public record. The practice of accepting public comment virtually, began during the pandemic.

You are recommending limitation of public comment, which is inconsistent with the first sentence of 5c:

c. Public Comment and active involvement of citizens in government is encouraged. The City Council will dedicate time during each regular meeting to hear from citizens on matters that are on the agenda and matters that are not on the agenda. The Council rules for public comment during special meetings and workshops are described in sections 4 and 2425. Public Comment allows members of the public to speak on topics that are not on the agenda. All public comment, regardless of the type of gathering, must be made in person—public comment will not be allowed virtually. Individuals who cannot attend the meeting in person but would like to have their comments entered into the public record can submit comments in advance by email before 3 p.m. the day of the meeting to administration@ci.red-wing.mn.us, or phone at (651) 385-3612. Such comments will not be read aloud at the meeting but will be entered into the record. All public comment will be made in person.

There is no encouragement, instead, it's discouragement, elimination of a viable means of participation. There is no increase in access, no fostering of public participation, and not even leaving it at status quo. Instead, you're recommending limiting participation to in person public participation.

- Who benefits from this?
- Who is shut out?

This is reminding me of a statement by NSP's Jim Alders about transmission proceedings, essentially that it would be so much easier if we didn't have to deal with those pesky people. You're perverting existing process to give the public the procedural finger.

YOU WERE ELECTED TO REPRESENT THE PEOPLE OF RED WING. YOU WERE ELECTED TO ACT IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST.

You were not elected to further your agenda or your adoption of another's agenda. You were not elected to shut down process, to limit public participation, to stop people from speaking up and being heard. And if you "recall," a large factor of Recall City Hall was about being heard and that process be open and transparent. "I'm all about transparency," right? HA!

Councillors Biese, Kliewer, and Farrar, and Mayor Wilson, this recommendation is against the public interest.

At what point does shutting down participation options go beyond an action against the public interest into misfeasance and/or malfeasance?

Few participate virtually, and other than moi, few are commenting virtually, so I'm guessing that something I've said, or things I have been saying, themes I've raised, are things that you don't want to hear, and things that you don't want to be a part of the public record. Oh well!

6	Patricia Allende de Jung: Hi. You might have heard this already because I posted about this
7	online. I would like to speak I'm Patricia Allende de Jung, I live in Ward 2, and I am happy to
8	speak here. I would like to speak on the importance of public comment.
9	
10	It is essential for the good of the people that the City Council by its rules and procedures
11	encourages and provides equal opportunities for public comment. And I stand to speak to oppose
12	any suggestion that requires a person who wants to speak before the council to be physically
13	present in chambers in order to be recognized. As we all know, we have virtual meetings and
14	web ex and that makes it possible for people to speak from remotely when they're at home and
15	attend from home. The Council, I believe, should avail itself of the means of communications in
16	order to allow anybody who wants to speak to do so.
17	
18	It is not fair, right, or equal to make access and means to participate for those attending the
19	meeting virtually more cumbersome and less effective than it is for those who are able to be here.
20	I'm referring here to the suggestion that has been made that people attending virtually should
21	give up the right, or privilege, to speak publicly, via virtual meetings, an instead submit emails.

Sending an email that is read into the record after everything has been discussed, decided and voted on is not the same as having our voices heard when people can actually hear and consider what we say. Unlike when having to send a comment via email, there is a direct immediate connection and impact when we speak publicly in real time, when the metaphorical iron is hot, when people listening are plugged into the event as things are happening and it all comes together as a part of that meeting. As a result, what I would say, what anybody else would say, we carry the same weight, because everybody needs the opportunity to speak and be heard. Now when I stand to speak publicly at the City Council, I'm aware that I have two audiences. I come here to speak to the City Council, whose members, who sit in this membership and vote on things, and I speak to the residents of Red Wing who are here, who are listening online, who talk 14 with their neighbors. This gives me the opportunity to connect with two audiences immediately, which makes what I say much more influential, more effective, more powerful, and more 16 memorable. That does not happen with emails or other things after the fact. To sum: Having to attend meetings in person as a condition of being allowed to speak publicly is not fair or right. It is a rule that threatens, that treats one group of people differently than another. 20 it denies some people the opportunity to fully participate the same as other people, and it denies all people their right to know what the residents think, the neighbors and residents and fellow people think about the issues and concerns that affect us all. Not only might the City Council benefit from hearing and considering what I have to say, some of my public comments stir others

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to learn about an issue of importance that they should know about and be interested in. In effect,
my comments, or somebody else's who comes to speak here, might change minds, and make a
difference in how the Council reacts, considers the things, and ultimately votes, affecting the
very policy and proposals being considered and discussed, and that is the point of taking public
comments. So I would urge the Council to consider policies that incorporate things and needs
that are equal and fair and allow everybody the same opportunities and weight. There's
somebody that suggested to me always add emails to this. There is a possible suggestion that
emails could read aloud by someone who would stand at the podium here and give it the same
authority that anybody who is able to speak for themselves can do. All this is reasons why people
can't come here. A lot of people are disabled, poor, we don't have transportation, have kids at
home, and probably the most disparate effect on people are the people who are low income, and
people of color, and the elderly. So let us do better than that. And I ask that you consider that
when you do any changes to the rules and procedures that you consider. Thank you so much.

Biese: Move on to Item 10C, it's a Motion, to consider a Motion to adopt resolution number
7852 amending the Rules of Order and Procedures for the City Council in accordance with the
City Charter 5.04.
Kuhlman: If you would prefer, I'd like to, or if you're OK, I'd like to walk through these
changes, proposed changes. If you remember back when we did the rules, for the organizational
meeting, we adopted, or we had proposed Rules of Order, and we did get some suggested
changes from a local citizen, Carol Overland, who I believe is online, and had said she has
comments or questions. Last week, a committee of council members sat down and walked

1 through the proposed changes by Carol, and if you recall, we did also have comments from our 2 City Attorney, and so we talked through each one of those and in the end came up with a series 3 of proposed changes. 4 5 So, the first one, on the track changes, p. 1., is just a housekeeping change, that's the, that if you 6 do approve this resolution, it supersedes the old one. 7 8 On page 2, under 5c, there is language to talk about virtual meetings, and so you heard some 9 comments tonight earlier about that, that's one, this language would then say that we do not have 10 virtual public comments, people would provide those by email or through being in the city 11 council chambers. 12 13 Under 5d, under the Statement of Intent, we added language so that the Council President would 14 determine whether that was part of the agenda, and I did note that there are several Boards and 15 Commissions who routinely read the Statement of Intent, and there are some who only read it at 16 their Annual meetings, and there are some who do not. We made that an option for them so they 17 can choose whether they read that or not. 18 19 Moving on, number 7, under 5d, the listing of the agenda, we switched the Presentation and 20 Public Comment, because we have been providing for presentations first so that it just makes 21 sense to explain that order. 22 23 If you move to page 4, number 10, as we looked at that language, we thought it was really dated,

1	because under no circumstances, I believe, would we go out and find a council member if we
2	need a quorum, so we changed that to how we operate now. So if a quorum is not present, a
3	majority of the members present may cancel the meeting. I don't remember that happening
4	except for one time, and I think that was a Board of Equalization meeting where we didn't have a
5	quorum. Otherwise, generally people call in, and if we know in advance, we can postpone that
6	meeting and do a special meeting.
7	
8	On page 5, number 16, this also changes the language to reflect the way that we operate, this has
9	been our practice, normally if there's a roll call vote and if it's somewhat equal, with the ayes and
10	nays, the Council President will say OK I want a roll call vote, it's always after both the ayes and
11	nays are stated, so it, and the language in that, you have to ask after the aye vote and, but, and
12	before the nay vote, which, that's just not the way we've done it, so this language, we checked in
13	with our attorney, this language is appropriate, and so we modified that.
14	
15	And then the last one was to clarify, lately, I guess last year, we took the Youth Commission and
16	the Harbor Commission and turned them into committees, so we added language to differentiate
17	between, those are committees, but they're not the direct committees of the City Council, so the
18	Council has standing committees and has the ability to do ad hoc committees, that is what we're
19	talking about in the Rules of Order. We are not talking about committees that are under our
20	Board and Commission and Committee policy, so that is why Section 27 was added.
21	
22	So on each of these, I did check in with the City Attorney, they're fine. The one thing I did want
23	to point out is there under 5C, when I was doing the strike out language, some of the language

1 that is not stuck out is not in the old one. This is more than just new language and newly struck 2 out language. That's not very clear, but what I want to tell you, this language that's in this 3 paragraph C is a little bit different in that we're keeping language, we're proposing to keep 4 language that wasn't in there before. So this is what... if you look at the language that was 5 accepted, that is what we're proposing. 6 7 So that is all I have as a high level, I can answer questions, or you can just discuss them one by 8 one. They are each stand alone, don't have to take it as an entire proposal, each one stands alone. 9 Farrar: I'll start off with a couple of questions, if that's OK. Kind of on the idea of public 10 comment, can you maybe say, is public comment, legally, do we have to do it, and secondly, 11 when did we start doing virtual public comment. 12 **Kuhlman:** I don't think you have to do public comment, I think that's an option of every 13 government entity. The virtual started when we went to virtual meetings with COVID, so we, 14 that has been a newer addition to our agenda. 15 Farrar: Thank you. 16 **Biese:** We have a number of people that want to speak, so we'll hear what they have to speak 17 before we decide. So, we'll start with Martha Harris, you're virtual. I need bigger print, or 18 bolder, I can't read that. You're on mic... 19 Martha Harris: All right. Thank you Council Members, staff, and Mayor Wilson for letting me 20 speak again tonight, virtually. I am speaking to 5c, I would like for you to continue allowing 21 virtual attendees to talk at Council meetings, as I am now, for the following reasons. One, it 22 would close a door to communication. Decreasing access can decrease the opportunity for your

constituents to participate in matters of our community. And two, concerns of disease

1 transmission, when folks have that scratchy throat or some body aches, they will not practice 2 best practices and public health recommendations and stay home. When they're passionate about 3 something, they will come through that door to speak. Three, folks who have missed their bus, or 4 perhaps they go out to their car and it will not start, they are unable to get to the meeting and may 5 miss the 3 o'clock deadline. And I too wanted to be at this meeting tonight with many of my 6 friends that I've met through pickleball, and unfortunately this morning as I headed out, the rear 7 end of my car, as I exited my driveway, slid around and was headed down the road backwards on 8 our icy hill. We have two different contractors that service our road between my home and access 9 to Hwy 61 to come into town. One of the contractors evidently had plenty of sand and gravel, 10 another section of my road, over one mile down hill was still iced over when my husband came 11 home this afternoon. And therefore, I was not going to leave the house tonight in order to come 12 to the meeting because it was not safe for me. That's all I've got. Thank you. 13 Beise: Thank you. Next would be Terri Cook, unmute yourself. 14 **Terri Cook:** Hi, good evening, can you hear me, one, two, three... 15 **Biese:** Yes, we can hear you. 16 **Terri Cook:** Great. My name is Terri Cook, and I live in ward 3, it's a recent move. I wanted to 17 share my concerns regarding the proposed changes to the rules. Great effort has been put into 18 developing ways to increase public input into decisions that will ultimately dictate our futures. 19 An engaged public will always give you better buy-in. During the campaign, many of you 20 mentioned that you and/or your neighbors did not feel heard at council meetings in the past, so I 21 ask you, if you want your constituents to be heard, and feel heard, wouldn't it make more sense 22 to invite their comments rather than eliminate options for participation? If you want a more

robust conversation or a stronger buy-in, why would these proposed changes be coming out of a

1 private meeting rather than a public forum? I guess that's up to the council to talk about that part. 2 I urge you also to consider keeping the Statement of Intent as a standard agenda item for the 3 Council. There was a strong purpose behind initiating this. Do you want respect and civility at 4 the meetings? That's what that statement indicates, and it reminds us all at the beginning of the 5 meeting, that were here to do the business, we're here to work respectfully and civilly. We've 6 seen what it's like when it doesn't go that way. So why not keep it in, and keep that reminder in 7 front of us, that you are a civil and respectful body and that you expect that in return from us. I 8 think that could go a long way in both directions for sharing our ideas back and forth. I feel as 9 though we're going backwards if we adopted those two particular changes. Imagine, just 10 imagine, you've got something big coming up, and you want, you feel very strongly about 11 something, and it's going to impact your neighbors, and you, wouldn't you want full disclosure, 12 open communication, full and robust, full and robust conversation regarding it, so that that way 13 everyone feels a part, and everyone then has that buy-in. We build a stronger community when 14 everyone is a part of that community. And that's why I think that virtual conversation is so 15 impactful. And I know Martha said why she couldn't be here in person, but respectfully, that's no 16 one's business. If I can't make it to the meeting, for whatever reason, I shouldn't have to share 17 that reasoning with anyone I don't want to share it with. I respect what you do, but I expect you 18 to respect what we do and what we as citizens have to offer. Imagine the things we could do to 19 together if we worked together. Thank you. 20 **Beise:** Alan Muller, would you like to speak on this? Alan, would you like to speak on this? 21 Alan Muller: Alan Muller 1110 West Avenue. A couple of preliminaries. The last time I stood at 22 this podium a few weeks ago, I commented that the hearing aid devices were not present. And 23 they still aren't. OK. I don't know why. If you look at the last page of the agenda, it states says

1 "hearing assistance devices are available during meetings." So I repeat my recommendation that

2 you find the ones we already own, or buy some new ones, or do whatever is necessary, to live up

to this accessibility point.

5 Second preliminary, I talked a little bit earlier about charging stations, and I hope I did not give

anyone the impression that I thought we don't need more charging stations. Electrification of

transport is a basic part of any serious effort to abate climate change. The issue is that utility

regulatory matters tend to be very complicated and mostly understood by the utilities themselves,

and the devil is in those details, and you need to make an effort to understand those before

10 commenting.

I'm really up here to talk about Agenda Item 10C. which is Rules of Order and Procedure. And like the previous witnesses, I think, I am kind of baffled as to why this council would want to deny people an opportunity to testify – virtually is the term used in the regulation. But it's ironic that we're discussing this on a night when we've got wet ice all over town, and I imagine that we all know someone who has fallen and broken their hip, or broken their head, by falling. Winter is a little dangerous in Minnesota in that respect, so just from that point of view, your proposal to not allow people to participate remotely is totally inappropriate. And I would truly appreciate knowing what the reasoning is, what the other side of the story is, if there is one. It just doesn't make any sense, unless one supposes that the intent of the council is to make public participation more difficult. And it does seem to me, I've lived in Red Wing for 15 years and I've commented fairly often to this Council, to the Charter Commission, and other bodies, about the importance of strengthening public participation. We live in times when democracy is under attack, and there

- are lots of things we can do. So why have you rolled out this document which attempts to put us
- 2 in reverse. And I'm not going to go through all the objectionable phrasing here, but some of the
- 3 things that I've mentioned in the past is a good faith public notice means put it on the website, it
- 4 doesn't mean posted on a bulletin board in the attic of this building or something like that. And
- 5 there are lots of other examples, Carol has identified some of them and maybe she's going to talk
- 6 about that some more. But I would urge you not to move ahead with the adoption of this
- 7 resolution which would alter the Rules of Procedure and Order and weaken the ability of Red
- 8 Wing residents to participate in their own government. That's disgraceful. Frankly, the authors of
- 9 this document, in my opinion, should be ashamed of themselves. Common sense tells us that it's
- a step in the wrong direction. So I'm done, unless anybody has any questions.
- 11 **Biese:** Thank you, Alan.
- 12 **Kliewer:** I see a hand up.
- 13 **Biese:** Thank you. Carol Overland, if you'd like to unmute yourself.
- 14 Carol Overland: You bet I would, Carol Overland, Ward 2, oh, there we go. I first want to state
- that at the last meeting that you had, which I attended virtually, we were up at a cabin at Lake
- Vermillion State Park. I participate remotely often, at the Public Utilities Commission, court
- 17 hearings are now virtual, also Public Service Commission in Wisconsin, Minnesota here, so
- much is virtual now, and it really does help people weigh in. And so I saw this, and as you know
- 19 I had been part of the Citizens Assembly that suggested many specific things to increase
- 20 participation, to open meetings up, and to have "better meetings," that was a goal. So many of
- 21 the City's plans now, plans that you should know of, specifically seek to encourage and increase
- 22 public participation. So what the heck are you doing? You're turning it around. We have a
- 23 situation here where four self-appointed arbiters of participation drew up this resolution. From

1 what I can see, there's not even input from our Community Engagement Specialist, that is the 2 title of Michelle Liese's job. I think that you should ask her to weigh in on this, because that's the 3 job. "Community Engagement Specialist." You are meeting in private, and you didn't move 4 forward with any of the things that would facilitate participation. All you've done is write up a 5 resolution prohibiting virtual comment, eliminating the Statement of Intent, making it more 6 difficult. And while previous speakers, who I would like to underline what they said, they're very 7 generous in their, discussing what they think is happening here, From a lawyerly standpoint, and 8 looking at inferences, it's pretty clear to me that what you're trying to do is limit public 9 participation, especially following the attempt to eliminate virtual meetings completely. This is, 10 yes, as Alan said, this is disgraceful. It's crucial that comment be allowed in any way possible. 11 You remember in the comments, in the proposals I made, I stressed that it would be good to have 12 a written clear option encouraging people to send emails before the meeting so that you would 13 have time to think about it, rather than spring things on you on the spur of the moment during the 14 meeting. And you know, it's just a common sense kind of thing, trying to make clear ahead of 15 time so people can figure out where they stand on something. But anyway, this proposal, just 16 wow, and just no. Because it looks very clear to me that the intent is to shut people down, and to 17 limit participation, and that's not OK, not OK. Thank you. 18 **Biese:** Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on this? Would you like to go 19 through the changes line by line, or what would you like to do? Evan? 20 **Brown:** I'd like to add something, I guess I heard here, Rules of Procedure are for the entire 21 council. They're our Rules of Procedure. I don't think it's appropriate to have a situation in 22 which that discussion happens with a group of people and not the entire council as a body. I think 23 that is inappropriate. It bothers me a lot, it bothers me a lot. Those are not... that's our, all our

- 1 rules of procedure, we all operate under, we all have a voice in, and we all need to talk real time,
- with each other, about those changes. I don't think that that's a lot to ask. I really do think that is
- 3 very, very important. So procedurally, I'm already irritated.
- 4 **Biese:** Thank you. It's no different than how I was treated for four years. I was left out of a lot of
- 5 things, so... We haven't made a decision here, that's why we're here to vote on it tonight. If we
- 6 don't want to vote on it, we don't have to vote on it.

- 8 Kliewer: I take offense of the fact that people in the public are under the impression there was a
- 9 secret meeting, there was an agenda meeting which is an open meeting and to the public, you
- 10 could have been there if you wanted to, you know when it is, anybody could have been there on
- this council. This document, we'd received the changes, recommended changes, referred to legal
- 12 counsel for review, we came back to the agenda meeting, and we went through it line by line and
- made whatever agreed or disagreed with the, the, with what our legal counsel thought. So there's
- 14 nothing secretive about it, and it's open for discussion. Talk about it.
- 15 **Brown:** I have never, ever, seen an agenda item that went through line by line review of the
- 16 resolution, I've never seen that. Never seen that.
- 17 **Kuhlman:** I just want to clarify, it was the Agenda team, but it wasn't as part of the agenda
- meeting, we did that in a separate meeting.
- 19 Kliewer: Yes. OK.
- Norton: So it was a separate, not a publicly noticed meeting...then..
- 21 **Kuhlman:** Correct.
- 22 Kliewer: I stand corrected.
- Norton: We couldn't all attend because it's not a publicly noticed meeting.

- 1 **Kliewer:** Well, there's nothing, I mean, it's open for discussion, so, share your thoughts. .
- 2 **Norton:** Well, my question I'll start, with whatever, my question is, why, help, the committee,
- 3 apparently a committee, did we discuss creating a committee to review these? As a Council, we
- 4 do that, from time to time, talk about creating ad hoc committees to do a study, or a dive. Was
- 5 there a conversation that happened that I just missed somehow?
- 6 Kliewer: There's no committee, it was the leadership team that dealt with it. I mean we simply
- 7 went through the documentation, I think you received the same thing.
- 8 **Norton:** I'm still asking, did we as a Council establish a committee to review this?
- 9 **Kliewer:** That's what we're doing right now.
- Norton: No, we're having a public discussion right now. I'm asking if we had a committee, I'm
- asking President Biese, if we have a committee.
- 12 **Biese:** No, we did not.
- Norton: OK. Thank you, that was the question I'm asking. So having said that, it does say in the
- write up, a committee of Council members met on this and made some recommendations. My
- 15 questions are, to the committee, to explain why these decisions were made. I'd like to know why
- the Intent is optional, the other, some of them are obviously clean up things, I'd like to know
- 17 why the virtual meeting is changed, and I'd like to know what conversation took place regarding
- 18 Ms. Overland's comments, I mean, none of her comments are incorporated into this, and so I feel
- like I'm really left out of that conversation, and I feel I'm really left out of that, and I'd like to
- start there.
- Farrar: I don't mind making a couple comments on that, so I'm on the statement of Intent, I
- 22 think many of us believe, and I'll speak for myself, I don't intend to speak for Kim or Don, but
- 23 you know, in my experience in the last year, if you guys made the statement of intent, I didn't see

1 a lot of respect and dignity happening, so I kind of felt it was a lot of words and maybe not 2 actually happening, and I felt it made sense for the President of each committee or commission 3 to decide if they want to do it or not, what was best for their group of people, so I'll stick with 4 that one. 5 6 And second, on the virtual, I believe that the Council is here to do business, public comment is 7 not legally binding, we have done our gracious part of allowing and asking for public participation and public comment, but we're here to do business, in my opinion. And so we have 8 9 public comment, they can email, they can come to the stand and speak to us, but in my opinion, 10 in watching, again, for the last year, the virtual content is not extremely useful, or business-like, 11 it doesn't work well. And I just think, in this day and age, virtual participation engagement is 12 awful, I think we all know from COVID, which with virtual, it started in COVID, we haven't 13 been doing this for like 15 years, virtual and going on screen is not conducive to good 14 engagement. I would rather have a face to face with people being here, or a true community 15 group talking to each other, one on one, talking to each other and really seeing each other's faces, 16 body language, and that to me is public participation. And I forget what the last one, the last 17 question? 18 **Norton:** What are the results of the recommendations of Ms. Overland... 19 Farrar: Well, we went and took Carol's and took our legal counsel, and went one by one and 20 took our time to do that, and everybody got Carol's comments, and anybody else that would have 21 commented on the subject, and I don't think one person in our community was taken more 22 highly or at a lower end than anybody else.

Norton: I don't understand what you're saying...

- 1 Farrar: I don't understand why Carol's comments on this would make any difference, than
- 2 anybody else's, than Patricia's or Martha's or anybody's. So we were given that, all of us as a
- 3 Council, Carol's comments, so we took our legal counsel and Carol's comments together with
- 4 our current rules of Order, one by one, and decided, I believe we did take a couple of her
- 5 comments, and again, she helped us see some clarity, and maybe some misunderstandings, so I
- do believe we took a couple of her ideas, I don't have my notes exactly which two, we took a lot
- of time to do this, mainly because we are the Executive Leadership Committee, we were elected
- 8 in a majority way, and that was our direction. I know that council member Biese, our President, I
- 9 think spoke with each of you. You guys knew that when you're President this is what happens.
- 10 You get to decide how things are going to be done.
- Norton: I don't follow, you spoke with each of us about what?
- 12 **Farrar:** That might be the wrong way of saying it. But in the absence of, you know, whether it's
- the Statement of Intent, or something, these are going to be decided tonight, we're going to talk
- about it in the group, that's why we're here tonight, nobody's limiting discussion.
- 15 **Norton:** Is there an Executive Committee?
- 16 **Beise:** No.
- 17 **Farrar:** I maybe missed... we used to call it an Executive Committee on the School Board, you
- 18 know, like a, an Agenda Committee to me is like an Executive Committee. So it might be
- 19 misusing words.
- Norton: The agenda committee is the committee that meets to go over the agenda. That's it.
- 21 **Farrar:** Is that traditionally, it's been done in the past...
- 22 **Norton:** Yes.
- 23 Farrar: Yes.

- 1 Kliewer: I would add that, you know, for the most part, a lot of, most virtual meetings ended
- with COVID, and that is over with. You know, the main thing to me, is I think, I think, a person
- 3 can relay a whole lot more to us standing at the lectern there than they can over virtual, and I
- 4 look at what, just how well virtuals worked for our school kids, and I think it's not that well. So
- 5 you know, I don't see it's that big a deal. We can communicate with people, they can write to us,
- 6 they can call us, there's many ways they can communicate with us if they want to. We're still
- 7 going be streaming. One of the other issues that I ran into is in trying to watch a lot of meetings
- 8 from the commissions, they have so much trouble getting people to be able to log on, I think that,
- 9 that, several times I witnessed where they just couldn't get them here. If it's a technical issue, I
- don't know, but I don't know that it's that critical.
- 11 **Brown:** My entire world...
- 12 **Biese:** Excuse me, Evan... Vicki Jo –
- 13 **Lambert:** My um, in response to what I'm hearing people say, and I'm, I don't have the history
- here, so I see, I know, that when I ran for this one of the things that I wanted to do was to engage
- more people. And when I see us saying that we don't want to do this because this isn't what we
- used to do, I feel like that's saying "I don't want certain people to participate because they can't
- be here." And I know that there are a lot of people in my ward who don't have cars, but they
- have a cell phone, because everyone has a cell phone, so they can log on to a meeting and they
- can be present, even if they can't get here, because they walk everywhere. So if I can't get here,
- then I'm invited to not participate. I'm invited to not be part of this, and I think that yes, I agree,
- face to face is great, and I think that virtual participation is critical in this day and age. This isn't
- 22 exclusively virtual participation, this is both, and, this is in person AND virtual. Locking people
- 23 out, I think is, quite frankly, it bothers me a lot, and I feel like it's trying to silence voices of

- 1 people that maybe aren't able to be here, Even if they were here in person, you know, and I saw a 2 lot of name calling from people from our community attacking the council, so I feel like 3 something, and I saw it, and it made me physically uncomfortable and sick, because people from 4 the community were yelling. This is important (holding up Statement of Intent). This is 5 important for us to remember, and to speak about every single time because repetition helps us 6 remember what we're here to do, and we are here to do the business. We are here to do the 7 business, to represent the public, with the public, and if we aren't including the public as part of 8 our process, we're missing the ball, and I think that we're becoming exclusive, and I'm not 9 interested in having a club that does business in secret. I'm not interested in being just here 10 alone. I'm interested in engaging the maximum number of people possible, and I think the 11 both/and proposition and for those reasons I do not support 5C changes, here, and I also think, 12 and I don't support changing 5d Statement of Intent. Because I think it's important that we 13 remember that we remember that we have to remind people that this is about all of us, it's not 14 about me, it's about all of us, any one of us or a small group of us that gets to make decisions. I 15 think in the case of this, we should have gone through this line by line as a group, and yes, it's 16 going to take some time. And I would have appreciated an invitation to that meeting, because I 17 would have come. But I wasn't invited. And I'm a member of the Council, and my voice is 18 important too. And I don't, I don't feel like I'm important, or valued, when a group of 19 people get together and they put together a proposal, a resolution, that I didn't get to have any 20 say or voice in. That's just me talking about, and I get to sit up here with all of y'all, and I don't 21 have this history and I don't feel comfortable with this being here like this and not having been 22 invited to this meeting. I would have gone. That's all I have.
- 23 **Beise:** Evan, go ahead...

Brown: In the case of the virtual meetings, my business has completely changed, the world has completely changed, and whether or not COVID is here or not, and we're going to disagree about that, but the world has changed. The technology has moved past it and the genie is out of the bottle. We do have this tool, and I think it makes, to Vicki's point, we should utilize it, why wouldn't we utilize it. Why, why, why would we go backwards, because it's not causing any problem, and to the degree that there are some minor problems at some, with a board or commission, in terms of reaching this body, which is where it really stands, where the interest really is, I see no reason to preclude a tool that has been utilized, and continues to be utilized. I mean it's like saying "Oh, you know, well we have landlines, but hey, you know these cell phones, they're just a fad, we should just move past those and go back to land lines," you know, and the technology has changed. Like it or not, my entire business is in, I don't even know how many, it's not a huge company, and we are in a bunch of states and countries, all over the country, and how do we communicate, how do we interact? We are all building product together, we are doing intense technical work, business together, and we can manage that online and I don't understand why we would take that tool away at all. **Goggin:** So the only concern I have is 5c as well. I do most of my work virtually, for my job. Most of the comments I've gotten about this issue, people want to have that availability to do this. But I would really like to see this be the exception rather than the rule that you would comment virtually. I think people should get here, people should get here from behind our keyboards, interact as individuals in the public, as we walk in the door, walk to the lobby, we're going to get other people's opinions, you can start talking, instead of just presenting, and what you want to say about a particular issue, you get to debate it with somebody else, either before or after the meeting, or whatever. So for me, I don't think that the virtual comments is something

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- 1 that we should get rid of.
- 2 **Biese:** I talked to a lot of people at the conference this weekend. None of them are continuing to
- 3 do virtual meeting, and I talked to more than 30 of them. They've all gone back to in person
- 4 meetings and eliminated virtual because of the staff issues they had, always staffing it as well as
- 5 they felt that you should be in person. And with that, I'll make a motion that we table this until
- 6 we can have a workshop and discuss and go through it, line by line.
- 7 **Brown:** Second
- 8 **Biese:** Motion by myself Kim and second, Evan, to table 10C until we can have a workshop and
- 9 go through it, line by line. All in favor?
- 10 **Brown:** 10C or the whole thing?
- 11 **Norton:** 10C is the whole thing.
- 12 **Biese:** All in favor? (Aye, Aye, Aye, Aye, Aye, Aye, Aye, Aye.) Opposed? Motion carried.

What Is A Recall Process?

What is a recall process?

A recall process is a set of steps residents can take to petition for a special election on the question of whether an elected official should be removed. This process is outlined in the City of Red Wing Charter. You can read about the process under Section 6.12.

What can a Council member or Mayor be recalled for?

In accordance with the Minnesota Constitution and the City Charter, a Mayor or City Council member can only be removed if their conduct constitutes malfeasance or nonfeasance while in office. Few actions rise to the level of malfeasance or nonfeasance. If an action does not constitute malfeasance or nonfeasance, a city council may decide not to call a special election, as the Blue Earth, MN, City Council recently did.

Malfeasance has been defined by Minnesota courts as "evil conduct or an illegal deed, the doing of that which one ought not to do, the performance of an act by an officer in his official capacity that is wholly illegal and wrongful." Jacobsen v. Nagel, 96 N.W.2d 569, 573 (Minn. 1959). Courts have explained that this is a very high standard, usually involving a felony conviction, bribery, or unduly profiting from one's position as an elected official.

Nonfeasance has been defined by Minnesota courts as "neglect or refusal, without sufficient excuse, to do that which is the officer's legal duty to do." Id.

What is the first step in a recall process?

The first step in a recall process is that any five people who are registered voters in the city limits must form a committee for the purpose of bringing about a recall of any elected official (Council Member or Mayor) for malfeasance or nonfeasance while in office. In the case of the Mayor and Council Member At Large, the committee can be composed of registered voters from any ward of the City. In the case of all other Council Members, the committee must consist of registered voters from the ward or wards where the Council Member was elected.

The committee then must fill out and return a "Certification of Recall Committee" form to the City Clerk stating the committee's intention to bring about a recall, the name of the elected official who the committee is seeking to remove, and a statement of 250 words or less that outlines the perceived grounds for removal. One certification form is required for each official being brought forward for re-

What happens if the City receives a petition with what the committee views as signatures from 20% of the registered voters in the correct ward?

The City will review the petition to determine if it meets the 20% minimum number of signatures for the proper ward(s) and ensure that every signature is from a registered voter in the correct ward(s). The City has five days to determine if a petition is irregular in any way. If the City determines that the petition has the necessary number of signatures from registered voters in the correct ward(s) and that the petition is not irregular in any other way, the City Clerk sends the petition to the City Council to be considered at the Council's next regular meeting.

The Council will then decide whether to call a special election. If the Council determines that the allegations do not constitute malfeasance or nonfeasance, the Council has the option of declining to call a special election.

If a special election is held in the City of Red Wing, it is estimated to cost between \$4,000 and \$5,000 per ward. If all four wards had a special election, the estimated cost would be between \$16,000 and \$20,000.

What happens if the petition does not contain the necessary signatures?

If the petition does not contain the necessary number of legitimate signatures or is irregular in any way, the City will give the committee 10 more days in which to file additional signatures and to correct the petition in all other respects. No changes to the statement of the grounds for recall can be made. If the City finds the petition is still insufficient or irregular after those 10 days, the City Clerk must notify the committee of that fact, and the City Clerk will file the petition in his/her office as insufficient. After that, no further action is taken.

What are the stated grounds for recall that the committees have filed with the City?

To summarize, the recall committees state that Council members violated the Open Meeting Law regarding two issues - meeting in closed sessions in 2019 related to the purchase of the Bauer Built property, and meeting in closed sessions in 2021 related to the employment of Roger Pohlman. No other issues or disputes are part of the recall effort.

The following items are the stated grounds for recall:

- On June 24, 2019, Council members violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subds. 3 and 4 by discussing impermissible topics beyond the closed session notice for purchase of the Bauer Built property.
- On July 22, 2019, Council members again violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subd. 4.
- On October 14, 2019, Council members again violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subd. 4.
- On February 8, 2021, Council members violated Minnesota Open Meeting Law § 13D.04, Subd. 5, by meeting unlawfully without proper three days' notice; further, Council members voted to go into closed session without first identifying the employee or the allegations against the employee, in violation of Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subd. 3.
- On February 19, 2021, Council members violated Minnesota Open Meeting Law § 13D.05, Subd. 2(b) by voting unlawfully to deny an open City Council session for consideration of disciplinary action against Chief Roger Pohlman, thus infringing upon the rights of the public and Chief Pohlman to hear allegations against Chief Pohlman and to hear the reasoning and deliberations of the City Council, which led to his termination.

What is the background for the alleged grounds?

1. The first assertion is that on June 24, 2019, each of six Council members named violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subds. 3 and 4 by discussing impermissible topics beyond the closed session notice for purchase of the Bauer Built property.

What happened and the legal foundation: The City Council voted unanimously to go into closed session on June 24, 2019, to consider the purchase of the Bauer Built property. The Open Meeting Law allows governing bodies to go into closed session to, among other things, develop or consider offers or counteroffers for the purchase of real property. See Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 3(c).

Minnesota Statutes Section 13D.01, subdivision 3, provides that "[b]efore closing a meeting, a public body shall state on the record the specific

grounds permitting the meeting to be closed and describe the subject to be discussed." The Council President stated the grounds allowing the meet-

- ing to be closed by noting the statute that allowed for the closed session. The Council President also described the subject that would be discussed at the closed session. Following is what the Council President stated:

"The Open Meeting Law Minnesota Statute Section 13D.05, subdivision 3(c) allows City Council to close a meeting to develop and/or consider offers for the purchase of real property. Staff is asking the Council to close the meeting to develop an offer to purchase property at 1511 Old West Main Street, owned by MTRE Red Wing, Minnesota, LLC, Bauer Built. The property ID is 55-535-0580 and 55-535-0529. With that I'll entertain a motion to go into closed session."

The other provision that the committees allege was violated does not apply to closed sessions. Minnesota Statutes Section 13D.01, subdivision 4, provides:

- (a) The votes of the members of the state agency, board, commission, or department; or of the governing body, committee, subcommittee, board, department, or commission on an action taken in a meeting required by this section to be open to the public must be recorded in a journal kept for that purpose.
- (b) The vote of each member must be recorded on each appropriation of money, except for payments of judgments, claims, and amounts fixed by statute.

(Emphasis added.) This section does not apply to closed sessions as stated in the language above. Moreover, the Council does not take action on the purchase of property in closed session so there would not be any votes to record. Rather, the Council votes on purchase agreements in open sessions in accordance with the Open Meeting Law as discussed below.

The City ultimately purchased the Bauer Built property. The City approved the purchase agreement for the Bauer Built property at an open meeting on November 12, 2019, consistent with the Open Meeting Law. See Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 3(c) ("an agreement reached that is based on an offer considered at a closed meeting is contingent on approval of the public body at an open meeting").

Because the property has been purchased by the City, the closed session tape is now a public document. Please see the audio recording of that June 24, 2019, closed session [see city link http://www.red-wing.org/1064/You-Ask-We-Answer].

2. The second assertion is that the six said Council members again violated the Open Meeting Law, Minn. Stat. § 13D.01, Subd. 4, on July 22, 2019. What happened and the legal foundation: As noted in No. 1 above, Section 13D.01, subdivision 4, is not applicable to closed sessions. The City did go into closed session on July 22, 2019, to consider an offer on the Bauer Built property and to develop a counter-offer. The Council's action to close the meeting was taken in accordance with the Open Meeting Law, which allows meetings to be closed to consider offers on real property and to develop counter-offers.

Because the property has been purchased by the City, the closed session tape is now a public document. Please see the audio recording of that July 22, 2019, closed session [see city link http://www.red-wing.org/1064/You-Ask-We-Answer].

3. The third assertion is that on October 14, 2019, the six said Council members again violated the Open Meeting Law at Minn. Stat.§ 13D.01, Subd. 4. What happened and the legal foundation: As noted in No. 1 above, Section 13D.01, subdivision 4, is not applicable to closed sessions. The Council's action to close the meeting was taken in accordance with the Open Meeting Law, which allows meetings to be closed to consider offers on real property and to develop counter-offers.

Because the property has been purchased by the City, the closed session tape is now a public document. Please see the audio recording of that October 14, 2019, closed session [see city link http://www.red-wing.org/1064/You-Ask-We-Answer].

4. The fourth assertion is that on February 8, 2021, all seven Council members violated the Open Meeting Law, Minn. Stat. § 13D.04, Subd. 5, by meeting unlawfully without proper three days' notice and by going into closed session without identifying the employee or the allegations against the employee.

What happened and the legal foundation. Numbers 4 and 5 relate to an employment matter. On Monday, February 8, 2021, the City Council went into closed session for preliminary consideration of allegations against an employee. Minnesota Statute Section 13D.05, subdivision 2(b) states that a public body "shall close one or more meetings for preliminary consideration of allegations or charges against an individual subject to its authority." The statute states that the meeting must be open at the request of the individual who is the subject of the meeting. Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 2(b). The employee did not elect to have the meeting open, and so it was closed.

The February 8 Council meeting was also a regular meeting and so three days' notice of the closed session was not required. Three days' notice is only required for special meetings. See Minn. Stat. § 13D.04, subd. 2. The agenda for a regular meeting can be amended at the meeting.

In addition, the law does not require the Council to disclose the identity of the employee before going into closed session under this exception to the Open Meeting Law. See Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 2(b). (That is required when a meeting is closed to conduct an evaluation of an employee, but not when a meeting is closed for the preliminary consideration of allegations. Compare Minn. Stat. § 13D.03, subd. 3(a) with Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 2 (b).) There is also no requirement that the allegations against an employee be disclosed publicly before closing a meeting for preliminary consideration of allegations, and the City does not do that when it closes a meeting for this purpose because allegations against an employee are private personnel data under the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act. Minn. Stat. § 13.43, subd. 2.

5. The final assertion is that all seven Council members violated the Open Meeting Law, Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 2(b), by voting unlawfully to deny an open City Council session for consideration of disciplinary action against Chief Roger Pohlman, thus infringing upon the rights of the public and Chief Pohlman to hear allegations against Chief Pohlman and to hear the reasoning and deliberations of the City Council, which led to his termination.

What happened and the legal foundation: On Friday, February 19, 2021, the City Council voted to go into closed session pursuant to the attorney-client privilege. The Open Meeting Law allows a meeting to be closed pursuant to the attorney-client privilege. See Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 3(b). The Council President stated that the meeting was being closed pursuant to the attorney-client privilege and noted the subjects to be discussed as follows:

"The Open Meeting Law, Minnesota Statutes section 13D.05, subdivision 3(b), allows the City Council to close a meeting pursuant to the attorney-client privilege. The purpose of the closed session is for the Council to meet with the City Attorney to receive legal advice regarding a proposed agreement and release of all claims related to an employee. During the closed session, the City Attorney will advise the Council on the legal meaning of the proposed terms and the legal considerations and pros/cons of entering into the proposed agreement. There is a need for absolute confidentiality because the City's position would be compromised if such discussions took place in public and could be overheard by the other party. Accordingly, pursuant to the law I have cited, I will hereby entertain a motion that this meeting will be closed pursuant to the attorney-client privilege. I'm looking for a motion to go into closed session under Minnesota Statutes section 13D.05, subdivision 3(b), to consider and discuss a proposed employment agreement."

The committees cite Section 13D.05, subdivision 2(b), as the basis for the alleged violation, but that statute was not the ground upon which the Council closed the meeting; rather, the Council closed the meeting pursuant to the attorney-client privilege. The employee does not have the right to require a meeting that is closed pursuant to the attorney-client privilege be open, as the City Council is the client receiving advice. For that reason, the Council determines whether there is a need for absolute confidentiality based on the attorney-client privilege to close a meeting at which it will receive legal advice related to negotiations concerning a proposed employment agreement and a release of potential legal claims. City councils have the right to receive an attorney's advice on a potential agreement and release of legal claims in confidence, just as citizens have a right to confidentiality with their legal representatives.

What is the basis for the closed meetings and the Council's next steps?

The Council closed each of the meetings referenced in the recall petition in accordance with the requirements of the Open Meeting Law. The City Council has historically closed meetings when discussing property acquisitions or sales, threatened or pending litigation, or preliminary consideration of allegations against employees—and the Open Meeting Law allows meetings to be closed for each of these reasons.

If a recall petition is filed with the City with the sufficient number of signatures, the Council will consider legal advice about its options, which would include the option to not call a special election if the Council determines the allegations do not amount to malfeasance or nonfeasance.
